Former Local Girl Tells of Floods

A letter received by Mrs. Henry McEntire from Mrs. Pittsburger, formerly Miss Nell Billings of Hillsboro, tells of the late floods in California. The writer lived at Gerber, and the letter, dated October 28, is as follows:

"I lost most everything in the flood. All my trunks got wet and the house was full of water and mud. I am leaving here on the 10th of January for Portland, as I have all I want of California. It was the worst thing I ever saw. It just came down from the mountains two days before. My home is between two creeks and the water ran through the windows eight to 15 feet deep. I had to climb a tree to wait for boats to rescue me. I lost all my wardrobe and most of my household furniture. Can't find my dog and cats, and my fruit and vegetables. The people also went with the water. The people across the street lost 200 turkeys, a cow, and 400 chickens. They will never get things back as they were."

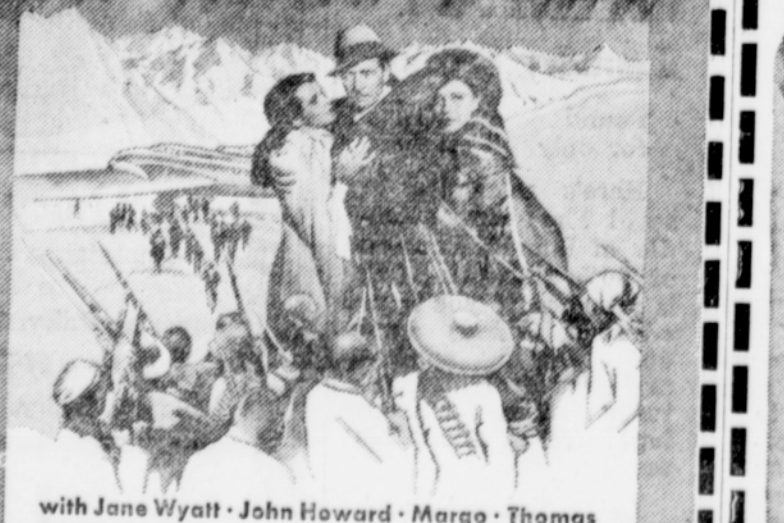
