### Many Farmers Want

Bot Treatment of Horses

Due to numerous requests for the treatment of horses for bots, Dr. R. J. Nicol, local veterinarian, and his associates, Dr. Bean and Dr. Almquist, have decided to put on a program whereby all farmers wishing to have horses rid of this harmful parasite may do so at a minimum cost to the owner.

Dr. Nicol states that he plans to mail out cards through various sections of the county and those desiring the treatment can return the card.

Many years in the past the bot fly has been considered rather harmless except as being a common pest during the summer months and early fall, but recent years have proven them to be harmful in their harboring in the intestinal canal, mainly stomach, in the form of larvae, sometimes causing severe cases of colic as well as keeping animals thin and in a run down condition. Extensive programs have been put on in the east and mid-western states with very appreciable results.

Treatment should be given in mid-winter and early spring.

All those desiring treatment should send their cards as soon as possible as we will make only one trip through each territory.
