

Dr. Martin Speaker P.T.A. Meet Monday

Dr. L. F. Martin, head of the Child Guidance clinic in connection with the public schools of Portland, will address the Hillsboro Parent-Teacher association at its meeting, Monday evening, at 7:45, in the Union high school. Dr. Martin's subject will deal with the principal problems presented by the exceptional child insofar as the school is concerned and how the school meets these problems. Dr. Martin is exceptionally well informed on this subject, having studied under Dr. Adler in Vienna. At present he is connected with the Edison schools in Portland and is also a member of the University of Oregon extension staff. All members of the Parent-Teacher association and everybody interested in this subject are urged to hear Dr. Martin. His talk should be equally interesting to high school as well as grade school parents, as both classes are included.

In order to permit Dr. Martin to start his address promptly at 8 o'clock, the meeting will begin at 7:45, 15 minutes earlier than the usual time.

Matthew Skene of the high school faculty is in charge of the program which will be followed by a social hour and refreshments.

Hints to homemakers and would-be-homemakers in the nature of culinary art make up the contents of a large number of books recently added to the Hillsboro library according to Mrs. Georgia Smith, librarian.

"Getting the Man with the Meal" is the interesting heading of one chapter in the latest of three books turned out by the popular writer, Marjorie Hillis. The chapter occurs in "Corned Beef and Caviar," a companion volume to her two earlier works, "Orchids on Your Budget" and "Live Alone and Like It." "Smart" recipes are made up a large section of the material offered in Miss Hillis' new work, with many suggestions given which, if followed, might not have a "Live Alone and Like It" sequel, Mrs. Smith said.
