Paris Police Still Digging for Victims of 'Bluebeard' Who Slew American Dancer

DARIS, Jan. 00 .- The workings of a killer's mind, the circumstances and events which transform a man who slays in homicidal rage into one who kills his victims calmly, almost casually, are engaging attention of Paris police as they search for additional victims of the modern "Bluebeard," Eugene Weidmann. In some ways Weidmann's record-no one knows just now many men and women he killed -parallels that of the earlier

"Bluebeard," Henri Landru, who killed 10 women and a boy in four years and died on the guillotine. Weidmann is held now in the same cell once occupied by Landru. Police have found one chief difference in the ghastly records of the two men, however. Landru planned his murders far in

advance and with deadly precision. He knew just how much money he would get from the slayings, just how he would accomplish the actual murders and how he would dispose of the bodies. He never admitted the

crimes, even on the guillotine. . . . WEIDMANN, on the other hand, appeared to take little pains with his plans. From the six persons he is known to have killed, the German apparently obtained comparatively little money, a few thousand francs at most. When the police finally found him he started shooting, was captured after a fierce gun battle, and then calmly confessed his crimes and told where at

least some of his victims were buried. Weidmann, moreover, had accomplices, in contrast to Landru who apparently worked alone. A scar-faced white-slaver, blackmailer and drug trafficker named Roger Million, together with his mistress, Colette Tricot, confessed after Weidmann was ap-

Old Age Insurance Claims Mounting

Approximately 800 American families are filing claims for old-age insurance settlements each working day, according to a Social Security Board report from Washington made public here this week by James E. Peebles, manager of the Portland field office, bureau of old-age insurance.

Pacific Coast states filed 4667 of the 61.531 claims received at So-cial Security board offices during the first 11 months of 1937, he re-ported. The rate of filing claims Was increasing with 4927 licted for was increasing, with 4297 listed for the first week in December. Set-tlements are made with two types of claimants: the estate of a work-er who died since January 1, 1937, er who died since sandary 1, 1937, provided he worked at employment covered by old-age insurance; and with persons reaching the age of 65, if they worked at occupations covered by the insurance between January 1 of last year and their 65th birthday. Settlements are computed at 3¹² per cent of total wages earned from the first of the year to date of death or 65th birthday. Portland's office is ready to handle all claims promptly, Peebles said, and will supply application forms and information on request to the office in the Old Post Office

building.
