### Aloha Man Visits Home Sir Walter Raleigh in 1918

ALOHA—"My army aviation corps was stationed at Queenstown, Ireland, in 1918," said Francis M. Coon. "One day off duty I stepped out of the 'stepping stone to America' as Queenland is called, to explore fresh wonders in this land of romance. After an hour's walk past stone towers and over green downs I stopped before a well preserved castle surrounded by a myrtle grove standing in the midst of what I afterwards learned was a 600-acre estate. A well-dressed old gentleman was superintending a mental task being performed by a body of servants. Recognizing me as an American doughboy his greeting was gracious and friendly.

"Yes, this is my home. It was also the home of Sir Walter Raleigh in the days of Queen Elizabeth, and he often entertained here his young boon companion, Will Shakespeare. I ask you honor me by coming in and looking around."

"He parted the thick vines before the portal to give us entrance. Standing in the living room which he called the 'Hall' it was a minute before I recovered from my amazement. I had never before seen such dazzling beauty in a home. My eyes focused on several large silver trays. My host asked me to lift one. I lifted one and grunted. It felt as though I had weighed a hundred pounds. It was made of old English coins beaten into a sheet. A picture of the chivalrous Sir Walter Raleigh hung over the fireplace, done with the whites and yolks of eggs, and its freshness was remarkable considering the lapse of four centuries. The next object to attract my attention was a wall several feet thick. Sir Walter's successor pointed out a secret entrance in this wall that led into an underground tunnel ending under a tower several hundred feet from the castle proper. Tunnel and tower were the means of escape for the ancient defenders when hard pressed by the foe.

"The billiard room seemed to be merely an excuse for a treasure room. The walls were covered with ancient weapons and geological collections. One rock, for once without a name, came from Oregon! I began to feel at home. 'At how much do you value this collection?' 'Oh, about 300,000 pounds (\$1,500,000).' The ceiling of this room was inlaid with gold ornamented in floral designs. I don't see how anyone could keep his mind on a billiard game in that room.

"As he was bidding me a courteous adieu, he seemed suddenly to remember something. 'See that grove of yew trees over there? See that old cannon and boy sitting on it? Well, where the cannon is was a bench in Sir Walter's day. Walter was a modernistic youth, always trying out new ideas. One day he sat under that very yew tree smoking the new-fangled Virginia tobacco. A servant, for once without bidding, threw a bucket of water over his astonished master to put out the internal fires.'
