"Child Problems" Theme of Speech at P-T. A. Meet

A large and attentive audience heard Dr. Lewis F. Martin's interesting address dealing with the principal problems presented by the exceptional child and how the school meets these problems, which was given before the members of the Hillsboro Parent-Teacher association last Monday evening at the union high school. Dr. Martin who is the head of the child guidance clinic in conjunction with the public schools of Portland and is also a member of the University of Oregon extension school staff, was introduced by Matthew Skene of the high school faculty.

Dr. Martin explained that the term "exceptional child" means those children who, due to mental, physical and moral characteristics, cannot be taught successfully with a group. The schools are concerned with four major types of exceptional children: the sub-normal, the superior, the speech-defective, and the physically handicapped. Dr. Martin stated that at present our schools are fairly well adapted to only about 50 per cent of the children. With the large number of pupils in an average class, the teacher must aim her instruction at the average child and cannot take care of the exceptional child. He also mentioned that there are about two million physically handicapped children in this country and only about 10 per cent are receiving special facilities. However, there is a bill before congress at present to provide special educational facilities for physically handicapped children all over the United States and every effort should be made by the various organizations and individuals to see that this bill is passed.

Mrs. Ed Kortzborn gave a short talk on infantile paralysis and urged everyone to support the health program for raising money to combat this disease by attending the dance January 29 at the Odd Fellows' hall and also other benefits for this purpose.
