County Seal Sale Hits New Time High This Year

Washington county's 1937 Christmas seal sale was a new all-time high of \$1246.10 with all returns in last week aside from two tardy districts, according to Mrs. Zola F. Morgan, sale chairman for the county.

This amount represents a sizeable gain over 1936, when totals reached \$1082. Mrs. Morgan said. Figures for the three preceding years were 1933, \$622.78; 1934, \$751.90; and 1935, \$988.46. By comparison, the 1937 figures are more than double those of 1933, and since half of the amount taken in goes to the county for its own tuberculosis prevention work, Washington county will have \$623.05 to work with during 1938.

Ninety-five districts in the county contributed to the success of the sale, with the average district return reaching \$13.12. Highest districts were Hillsboro \$209.90, Forest Grove, \$168.61; Beaverton, \$137.53; Tigard, \$63.59; Aloha-Huber, \$46.71; Metzger, \$25.

Alteration of the sale setup two years ago was given credit by Mrs. Morgan for the increase in amount and the gain in efficiency in handling the annual drive. Only districts not reporting were Wallace and Pleasant View.

Diagnostic Tests Set for Next Week by Superintendent

Diagnostic tests for all schools in the county outside of Hillsboro will take place Monday and Tuesday for pupils of sixth, seventh and eighth grades, according to O. B. Kraus, county school superintendent.

Specially prepared test blanks, which are being used throughout most of the Oregon counties, are being sent to all teachers of the three upper grades, and are intended to reveal to teacher and pupil the strength and weaknesses of the pupil in the various subjects.
