

Beaverton and Hillsboro Will Clash Friday for County League Leadership

Hilhi Quintet Annexes Two League Games

Leadership of the county high school league will be at stake Friday night when Coach Reece Hathorn turns his eager charges loose on the Beaverton high school floor against the as-yet unbeaten Beaver squad.

Both teams have played three tilts apiece, chalking up a victory on each occasion. Hilhi's victims include Forest Grove, St. Mary's and Newberg. Beaverton, after a miserable performance against Tigard in the county opener final game two weeks ago, bounced back to edge out a 26-to-25 win over the Tigers in their first league game. At that, comparative scores indicate a slight Hillsboro edge. Tigard walloped Beaverton, 10 to 1, in the opener, while they were hard pressed in their lucky 10-to-9 victory over Hillsboro.

The night's slate gets under way at 7:15 with a "B" game between second-string teams from the two schools.

Hilhi staged a thrilling finish in their basketball clash last Friday to come up with a 14-to-13 win over their traditional Forest Grove rivals in a county high school league game played here.

With half a minute left to go before the final whistle, and the Vikings leading, 13 to 12, a foul was called on a Forest Grove player, giving Bill Grogan two free shots. And with the outcome of the game depending upon his accuracy, Grogan proceeded to register two per-

150 Hillsboro Bowlers Enter National Tourney

CHICAGO, Ill., January 19.—(Special)—Hillsboro has become one of the nation's busiest bowling centers, according to a report from the national headquarters of the Red Crown Bowling Sweepstakes here.

Indication of the city's great pin activity was given today when officials conducting the \$34,000 Red Crown contest reported that 150 Hillsboro bowlers have enrolled in the prize competition. Figures revealed today show the entry list for Red Crown competition bulging with bowlers from all parts of the country, with 232,656 from 1,532 cities and towns throughout the United States taking part. This number, it was declared, is a world's record for participation in any single sports event.

Play Opens Monday

Qualifying play for the sweepstakes was completed December 19 for the purpose of classifying bowlers according to their scores. Final prize rounds are scheduled to begin Monday, January 24. No contestants are required to leave their homes at any part of the play, and teams are allowed to take part without entry fees, scoring only their regular league games. All play must be in leagues sanctioned by the American Bowling Congress.

Grand prizes total \$9,250, of which \$750 first prize, \$250 second, \$150 third and \$100 fourth in each of the five classes. Fifth to ninth place teams in each bracket win mineralite balls.

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Ex-Hilhi Hoopers in Badger Lineup

Two Hillsboro athletes, Lloyd Selfridge and Vernon Cook, are on the Pacific university basketball squad, an inspection of squad rosters released by Coach Pete Miller this week revealed.

Selfridge, one-year letterman at guard, is holding down a regular post on the Badger team this year, while Cook, also with a year's experience, plays a prominent relief role. Both are ex-Hilhi hoopers.

Pacific's 1938 team is handicapped by lack of height and experience, Miller said, with two freshmen being used in the starting lineup. Despite this, the current edition of the Badgers is an aggressive and fast team, with a stronger offense than last year. The team uses a fast break attack which was more or less abandoned midway through the 1937 season due to injuries and lack of reserves.

In their first 11 appearances of the season, the Pacific quintet has won six and lost five, scoring 391 points to opponents' 379. Eleven games remain, including two on the current week's schedule, before the Badgers wind up 1938 activity.

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
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
