In every section of the nation those interested in the campaign against infantile paralysis will find in order that sick people will be well in the first organized drive for funds for the newly-formed national foundation.

Funds derived from the anti-paralysis organization will be divided to the national fund for the first time, instead of being split on the 70-30 basis as heretofore.

Behind the formation of the national organization lies the idea of carrying on the battle against infantile paralysis on every front—by scientific research, epidemic first aid, proper care and orthopedic equipment.
