## Car Lot Established

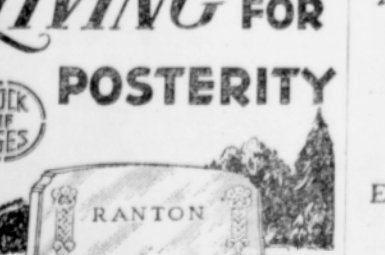

## 1937 Heaviest for Oregon Tourists

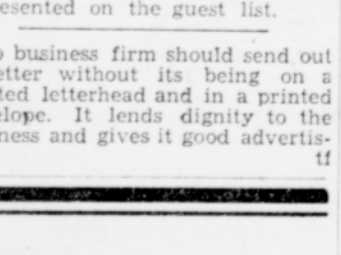
Not only was 1937 a blue-ribbon year for tourists in Oregon, but every month saw more non-resident motorists registered than in any similar month in the past. Secretary of State Earl Snell said this week.

December, with 5699 out-of-state registrations, brought the year's total to 155,161, nearly 11 per cent ahead of 1936, which was also a record-smashing year.

California led the parade of states in the number of Oregon visitors, with 78,753. Washington was second with 24,721 and Idaho was third with 5964. Other leaders were Canada, Nebraska, Kansas, Montana and Colorado. Altogether 47 states, the District of Columbia, seven territories and dependencies and nine foreign countries were represented on the guest list.

## Stock Ford Makes New Economy Run

Economy records were broken by the new Ford "Thrifty 60" model in a recent performance in the annual Gilmore-Yosemite economy run from Los Angeles to the famed Yosemite valley, according to H. L. MacKenzie, local Ford dealer.

Averaging 28.85 miles to the gallon of gas, the Ford stock model covered the 314.5 mile distance in 10 hours and 49 minutes, completing the "B" class of the contest. All told, only 19.9 gallons of gas were used in the run, while second and third place cars used 14.3 and 14.8 gallons respectively. There were 26 cars entered in the competition representing almost the entire field of American automobiles.

"We had expected a Ford record on the run," MacKenzie said, in commenting on the performance, "and the record made substantiates claims as to Ford's smooth and economical performance."
