In case the rear vehicle is disabled, however, the maximum distance is 25 feet. The latter distance also applies to vehicles drawing pole or pipe dollies. Whenever the connection between the vehicles consists solely of a chain, rope or cable, a red flag or similar signal at least a foot square must be displayed on the connecting strand.

No. In Oregon it is unlawful for you to stand in a roadway for the purpose of soliciting a ride from the driver of any private vehicle. Hitchhikers usually violate the further provision that pedestrians should walk on the left side of the roadway.

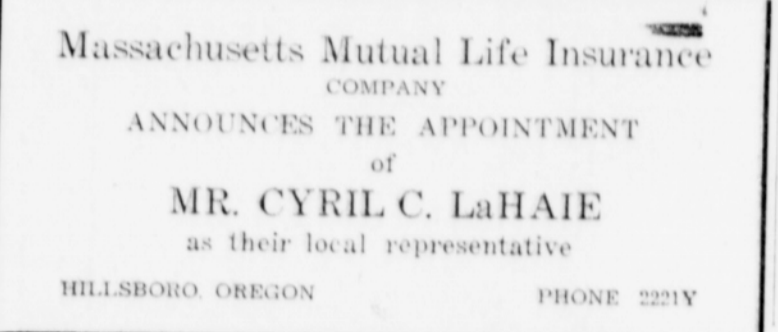

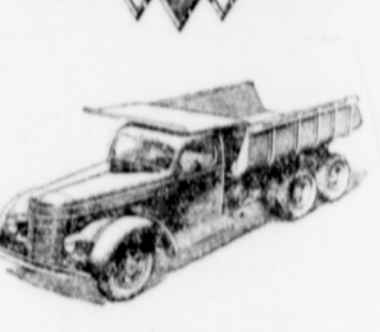
