

"Our Town's Business" Told at B.P.W. Club

"Our largest industry is farming. This county being a leading county in dairying, growing of strawberries, and nut culture," said Leon S. Davis, secretary of the chamber of commerce, in a speech before the Business and Professional Women's club Friday.

"Dairy industry has a total investment at the chamber of commerce valued at \$25,000-600, with 3440 of its 4175 farms devoted to dairying," he said. "These farms employ 5000 persons, and 89 per cent of the dairy farmers own their own farms, while the remaining 11 per cent are operated by tenants."

"Poultry is another industry which brings in nearly a million and a half dollars each year from eggs and fowls sold on the markets."

"English walnuts are grown almost entirely on the Pacific coast, with California and Oregon the chief source of supply. Total acreage in Oregon in 1932 showed 15,000 of bearing trees and 12,000 acres of non-bearing trees. Out of the total number of bearing trees in Oregon, 93,358, Washington county had 62,330," he said.

"Hillsboro Carnation Milk plant is the largest and most modern condenser in the state, and was the first plant west of the Mississippi river to install machinery to produce irradiated milk, an excess of the entire dairy output of the county is used by the condenser, with 70,000 pounds of milk being processed daily. Markets are mainly in Oregon, California, Hawaii and the Philippine Islands."

"Imperial Feed & Grain company products include all kinds of poultry feeds, dairy and hog feeds. These feeds are manufactured here, under an Imperial company label. All grain used for these products are bought in the county, but others are imported—fishmeal from Alaska, soy bean meal from China and the middle west, and cocoon meal from the south sea islands. The company employs 40 men during the peak of the harvest season, and averages 18 throughout the year."

"Hillsboro Feed company also manufactures dairy feed of all kinds and most of the poultry feed marketed under the I. X. L. trade mark. Raw materials such as local grains are purchased in the county, and the concentrates are imported from Portland markets."

"Haley Chicken cannery, near Hillsboro, produces chickens, turkeys and beef. Poultry is purchased in the county, and the remainder is purchased by Haley from the Portland Stockyards. This year the cannery produced 850,000 cans of processed meats, using 500 head of beef and 150,000 of poultry. Fourteen cannery employees are employed and the cannery operates on a year-around basis."

"B. E. Maling, Inc., now a part of the General Foods corporation, was established here in 1920 as the Ray-Maling company. During 1932 the cannery employed 1100 persons and had a total payroll of \$400,000. Ray-Maling and B. E. Maling, Inc. were set up as two distinct units for the first time last year. Ray-Maling is now a brokerage firm handling the B. E. Maling stock. About a million and a half dollars are used for raw material purchase during the year in the vicinity of Hillsboro."

"Present plans call for a 50 per cent larger frozen pack this year than last, while the canned goods pack will remain about the same."

"Another local industry which is growing steadily is that of the 'Qualin' Van and Winery, managed by Lee C. Bettinger, Davis said. "Twenty-two years ago Hare and Morgan, brother of W. G. Hare and father of G. Russell Morgan, formed the Hillsboro Concrete Brick & Tile company. The plant here, owned by G. Russell Morgan, purchased the business in 1916. Davis continued, "An average of 32 employees are required there throughout the year, and the mill has a capacity of 25,000 feet of lumber per day. Slab-wood and saw-dust by-products find an outlet in local and Portland fuel markets."

"Royal Soda Works here, owned and managed by Mrs. Hazel Gardner, uses three trucks and six employees to deliver its goods through the Washington county area. The new building occupied by the company on East Main street was completed last summer."

"Drain and building tile, heavy concrete pipe, foundation blocks and garden furniture are produced at the Hillsboro Concrete Brick & Tile company plant here, operated by Arthur Kroeger. At full speed the plant employs 12 men, although the usual number is below that figure. In addition, all kinds of building material with the exception of lumber is handled by the firm."

"Gates Pipe and Investment company is an example of a firm that went away and then came back. Established in 1890, it operated here for 10 years, then went to Dallas and since 1922 has been under the exclusive management of O. B. Gates. The plant cannot be operated with less than ten men, and at present has a crew of eleven. Pipe produced is marketed exclusively in the northwest, with Washington being a slightly higher consumer during the past two years than Oregon."
