Patent Granted on Equipment

CHERRY GROVE—Patent was granted last week on a three-way swivel invented by Leo Wickstrom of Cherry Grove and A. Weigant of Gales Creek. The men have been working to perfect their swivel during the past two years.

The three-way swivel is used for butt rigging for logging and also is used on ships for loading cargo. This swivel is already being used by local logging companies including those at Carlton and Vernonia.

Wickstrom and Weigant left for Eugene Monday where they will start work at once on a plant to manufacture their swivel and other logging equipment. They will supply South America, New York and San Francisco and all other parts of the United States. They already have orders ahead that will keep their plant running two months, so they are pushing work on the plant as rapidly as possible.

night, the Japanese refused admission to the houses, because some of the men had "insulted them by not taking our shoes off before we went in." On the afternoon of the second day, two U. S. destroyers arrived with fresh drinking water and the information that the President McKinley would pick up the passengers the next day.

Baggage Finally Delivered
Monday morning we got orders to go around to the opposite side of the island, where we would be taken aboard the McKinley. Schlegel wrote, "But instead I went back to where the Hoover was stranded, thinking some of the baggage would be brought in. I had dressed in a

gray suit before leaving the ship, and it was covered with oil and dirt, and the same as everyone else's clothing. No baggage was in, however, so I went around and boarded the McKinley. Shortly before we were to sail at 8 o'clock, we got word to wait for more baggage. Some of the McKinley's passengers loaned me his stationery. I had a bath and a change of clothes. We're due in Manila tomorrow.

And thus, some the worse for his experience, Schlegel completed his trip from Kobe to Manila, with an unexpected three-day stopover and a large helping of an unusual experience sandwiched between the two ports.
