

K. of C. Initiate 16 in Sunday Ceremony

Sixteen men were initiated to the first degree of the Knights of Columbus at initiation ceremonies held here Sunday, for the first time in 18 years.

Eleven of the initiates are members of the Hillsboro council, with three from Tillamook and two from McMinnville units of the Catholic men's organization.

Edmund and Leonard Peschka, George Van Dyke, Albert Van Dyke, Ernest Evers, Francis Walbel, Martin Senig, Eugene Schulte, Elvin Finegan, James Grogan and Raymond Van Dyke made up the Hillsboro council's section of the class. Walter Brown, Anthony Jenck and Dave Brown were included as the Tillamook council's new members, while Robert Kreitzer of Sheridan and Robert Bernard of Yamhill became members of the McMinnville council.

Three Degrees Given
Initiation ceremonies, which began at noon, were held in the Hillsboro Grange hall. First and second degree ceremonies were handled by Mount Angel, Eugene Schulte, Elvin Finegan, James Grogan and Raymond Van Dyke made up the Hillsboro council's section of the class.

The evening banquet, held in the chambers of commerce quarters, drew 175 persons, the largest crowd handled in the chamber's dining hall for several years. Ladies of St. Matthew's Altar society prepared the turkey dinner served.

"America, as well as the whole western hemisphere, was discovered by a Christian, and was later explored and colonized by Christians—all of whom based their work and efforts on teachings of Christianity. Any idea which tears these Christian principles from our government is anti-American," declared Frank Lomergan, prominent Portland attorney and former state legislator, in his talk at the banquet.

Three Principles Backed
"Marxism, on which communism is based, has for its foundation a denial of practically all Christian principles. The spread of communist propaganda is being very handsomely. Among our so-called 'intelligentsia' there are many who, knowingly or unknowingly, are fostering the growth of the bolshevik movement. All this, as well as fascism, nazism and all the other isms, are contrary to our American ideals of social justice, equity, freedom of speech and religious liberty."

Lomergan said, adding that "There has been too much time in the past when it is more important for the application of principles of charity, brotherly love and patriotism."

Mayor J. H. Garrett, in a brief address, welcomed all visiting Knights of Columbus in Hillsboro and extended an invitation for the future. Paul L. Patterson, chamber of commerce president, declared that "Citizenship, which is one of the principles of Columbianism, must be upheld rigidly by all patriotic organizations if the people of America are to continue to rule this country. Enroachment of 'isms' of all sorts provide a distinct threat to our American system, he said, and this can be overcome only by thinking groups of interested individuals."
