During February more than 26,000 Parent-Teacher associations will join in celebrating the 43rd anniversary of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, February 17. Through pageants, plays, special programs and contributions to the extension fund, tribute will be paid to Alice McLellan Birney and Phoebe Apperson Hearst, the founders. The organization now includes 2,556,777 members from all the states. Oregon membership totals the 39,990 mark and in Washington county there are 21 units. The four-year-old organization in Hillsboro has 139 members of which a fourth are in Washington, D. C., which is the United States. Here she saw a group of citizens representing the public interest in business, commerce and agriculture. But nowhere could she find a group that was primarily interested in America's greatest asset, children. She believed that a congress of mothers to study the needs of childhood ought to meet to plan a new social order.

All through the years of the congress the goal has worked toward the goal set up in those first meetings—that an understanding parenthood and trained teachers will secure for every child the highest possible mental, physical, social and spiritual education.
