More than a few Washington county athletes of other days should be able to qualify for some of the contests arranged as 1938 banquet features.

For instance, losing cups will go to the manager with the most ball players at the banquet who played on his team on or before 1913—which is just a quarter of a century ago; another to the manager having most players from teams of 1914 to 1924, and a third to the manager having the largest representation from teams managed from 1925 to 1935. Another award is offered for the manager of most clubs from 1925 to 1936, and still another for the player on most teams during the same period. Washington county, long a hotbed of baseball activity, should have several in the running for the various awards. Baby Beefers Scheduled for Contest Here

Highlight of the independent basketball season in Hillsboro is scheduled for Saturday night, February 12, when the "Baby Beefers," made up of members of the Oregon State college "beef trust" football players, tangle with Perfection Bakery team on the high school floor.

Heading the list of invading Oregonians is Joe Gray, All-Coast halfback, who rated mention on a composite of All-American football teams last fall. With pigskin chasing out of the way, Gray and seven of his fellow Beaver gridders have taken up basketball, which they promise to delineate in their own peculiar fashion when they appear here. Dick Sutherland, Hillsboro's latest contribution to big-time football, is also listed to perform for the "Baby Beefers." Others included on the O. S. C. team are John Watts, Elmer Kolberg, Johnny Alexander, Holly Holcomb, Frank Ramsey and John Hackenback.

Hillsboro's aggregation will present a strong lineup against the invading Beavers according to Manager Keith Wilcox. During the past few weeks the Bakers have turned in some excellent performances, and are currently listed as leading challengers for the second-half crown in the Big "B" hoop league.

Outcome of the promised game will depend to a great extent upon whether or not the gridders-turned-hoopers can stop the high-scoring antics of Warren Wahner, point-gaining Hillsboro forward, and his triple co-plotters, Peterson, McCoy, Ingram and Rueker. Bob Sutherland, younger brother of the husky "Beef" guard, is also listed for action in the starting Hillsboro line-up.
