Candidates Slow in Primary Filing (Continued from page 1) party for representative in congress at the general election of November 3, 1936, and representing at least one fifth of the voting precincts of the district. Minimum requirements for county candidates is 100 signatures for republicans and 150 for democrats, with 100 precincts to be represented. Filing Fees Given If a candidate prefers to file by declaration, he must accompany his declaration with a required filing fee. For U. S. senator this is \$150, with fees for all other state offices set at \$100, state senators and representatives, \$10, all county offices \$20; justices of the peace, \$5, and precinct committeemen, no charge. Terms of County Judge Donald T. Templeton, Commissioner Herman D. Kerkman, Treasurer Maud W. Boscow, Surveyor J. W. Barney and Coroner Fred J. Sewell expire this year. As yet none have made official statements as to whether or not they will be candidates to succeed themselves, although it is thought that most of them will run in the primaries.
