

# Battleship Oregon Campaign Starts

## Hugh Rogers Heads Local Area Group

Hugh S. Rogers, past state commander of the United Spanish-American War Veterans, has been named chairman of a committee to provide for the drive for funds to charge a memorial setting for the historic Battleship Oregon in Portland's harbor, it was announced here this week.

Rogers, together with his assistants, O. B. Kraus, county school superintendent and Mrs. C. E. Wells, city council member, were appointed by Governor Charles H. Martin and E. C. Sammons, who are heading the state committee supervising the campaign. Governor Martin made the principal speech at a "kick-off" dinner for the drive at the Multnomah hotel in Portland Monday. The drive will extend from Monday, February 13, through Saturday, February 17.

## Meeting Held Here

Portland's port commission has provided the grounds for a memorial berth for the battleship Oregon on the banks of the Willamette, and raising of the complete fund is being carried on to complete the memorial. Patriotic and civic organizations throughout the state are falling in line to back the movement, with school children also co-operating as the result of co-operation with Rex Putnam, radio school superintendent. Radio programs and school activities are reviewing famous accomplishments of the "old Bulldog" with the record-breaking performance during her run from the Pacific to the Atlantic at the opening of the Spanish-American war coming in for much praise. Chairman Rogers has called a special meeting of the Hillsboro Presidents' Council, including heads of all local civic and patriotic organizations tonight (Thursday) at 8 o'clock in the chamber of commerce rooms, to make arrangements for the drive in the Hillsboro area.

## Pin Balls Are Morgan Target

"Anyone knowing of the existence of slot machines or pin ball games anywhere in the county should report that fact to our office," declared District Attorney G. Russell Morgan yesterday, in commenting on the recent state supreme court decision declaring the pin ball machines illegal.

"There should be no misunderstanding regarding the slot machines," Morgan explained. "They always have been illegal and owners or operators have always been prosecuted. There are no new developments on them. Laws concerning the pin ball boards, however, were rather uncertain until the supreme court's decision last month confirmed them. Since there had been some uncertainty felt about the law, the peace officers of the state deferred action upon them."

"With the law definitely assured, pin-ball operators are now to be prosecuted fully. There are supposed to be no slot machines or pin-ball boards in the county—but if anyone knows of the existence of any of the district attorney's office should be informed. It should be kept in mind that it is unlawful to conduct, maintain or operate one."
