

### \$20,000 Suit Ends; Verdict for Defendant

After almost three hours' deliberation, a circuit court jury returned a verdict for the defendant in the \$20,000 damage suit of Philip Freeman against W. L. Raines, doing business as the Carnation Lumber company in Forest Grove.

Freeman had been injured in a lumber mill accident while employed there, and had claimed disability as a result. After three days' trial, the jury brought in the defendant's verdict, and the court ordered that Raines recover costs and trial disbursements from Freeman. Two previous suits over the same matter had previously been dismissed by Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters.

Charging that the defendant deserted her the day of their marriage, Mary Smith filed action for divorce from Edwin Smith in circuit court here this week. In the complaint, Mrs. Smith charges that following their marriage at Stevenson, Wash., December 17, 1937, the defendant took her to her mother's home in Portland and left her there. Since that time, the complaint continues, he has not seen the plaintiff or communicated with her except by letter.

### Revenue Man to Assist Taxpayers

For the convenience of those required to fill out federal income tax returns, the bureau of Internal Revenue will have a deputy collector in Hillsboro February 23 to 25, and in Forest Grove on February 26, according to a notification received at the local post office.

Hillsboro headquarters will be in the county courthouse while the collector will be at the Oregon hotel in Forest Grove. He will assist the taxpayers in preparing their returns, with no charge to be made for the service. The matter of federal income tax should be given immediate attention, the notice said, in order to avoid penalty and interest payments. Every single person with a net income of \$1000 or over or a gross income of \$5000 or over, and every married person with a net income of \$2,500 or a gross in-

### Compensation Check Number 4 Given Man Here

Check number 4 in the state unemployment compensation commission's first batch of checks went to a man registered with the Hillsboro office, according to C. L. Hulbert, senior interviewer in charge of Washington county work.

The check was paid out recently with the first compensation benefit awards to unemployed. Practically all unemployed claims have been paid out. Hulbert said. At first there was considerable delay due to difficulty in checking claims against the employment records in the Salem office.

During the past week, the calling days of a number of Hillsboro clients have been changed in order to equalize the week's work. Hulbert stated. Monday has been by far the heaviest day of the week and part of the Monday load has been shifted to Wednesday and Friday periods. In this manner, people are spared the inconvenience of long waiting and the work of the commission's staff here is equalized.

### Cornelius Council Against Power Unit

Cornelius' city council has gone on record as being opposed to establishment of a public power district, declaring the outcome would prove more trouble with the same or less service, and with no great reductions in cost.

Quotation of Tacoma power prices in comparison with local rates are in view of the fact that Tacoma rates are for dense population areas, with 1500 users per square mile, while Washington county would average from 12 to 15 users per square mile, or something under one per cent of the Tacoma average. Power there is distributed almost entirely in the city of Tacoma itself, while in Washington county nearly all would be for suburban use, it was stated.

Lack of competent managers would be another local difficulty, one of the council members pointed out. Few of the sections have men experienced enough successfully to manage power business, while companies set up for this purpose are experts at the work. Present rates are nearly the same as Portland's power schedule, it was declared.
