would require 7.99 per cent of the revenue dollar to replace the taxes now paid in the district by the private companies. The Tacoma public plant contributes 10 per cent. Besides, the utility spellbinders very cunningly refrain from disclosing that when the taxpayers save on their electric bills they will have more money with which to pay taxes. Private concerns only pay taxes with the money they collect from the taxpayers. The amount the taxpayers will save in one month by lower rates will more than pay for the special election, so every day gained in organizing the district is a distinct advantage to every taxpayer as well as to every domestic consumer of electrical energy.

Dog License Deadline Next Monday

Deadline for purchasing dog licenses in Washington county is next Monday, February 28. Beginning on Tuesday, March 1, a special dollar penalty tax will be added to the cost of all licenses, according to County Clerk W. A. Tupper.

During the past week, licenses have been issued at the rate of about 100 a day. Tupper said with an increase in this number expected before the deadline. Regular license fees are \$1 for males and \$1.50 for females, and \$1.50 for female dogs. The penalty fees will raise these to \$2 and \$2.50, respectively.
