

Hillsboro Five Clinches County League Title by Downing Tigard

Tigers Fall,
22-15, Before
Spartan Five

Hillsboro clinched the 1938 county league crown Tuesday night by coming up with a thrilling 22-to-15 victory over the Tigard quintet in a fast game on the Hillsboro court, but it took the strongest second-half comeback of the year to turn the past week by the local pin-men.

Tigard started out with a first-half rush that held Hillsboro Spartans to an unprecedented 10-w score. At the half-time rest period, Tigard led, 11 to 5. But the pennant-bound Spartans came back to turn on full power in the last half of the game, holding the Tigers to one field goal and four measly points while running up 17 of their own. In trouncing the Tigard five, the Hills quint assured themselves of the league title—regardless of the outcome of the last league tilt with Sherwood.

Grogs in Lead

In the first meeting of the season, Tigard took a 10-to-5 win from the Spartans in the first game of the county opener program. Later on, Hillsboro bounded back to victory, 23 to 16, which was the same winning margin as Tuesday's game.

Bill Grogan, named captain for the evening, responded by running up nine points to lead scoring. Lanky Ted Beckham, Tigard center, had eight to his credit when the fireworks were over, but Ashmore and Nunnemacher, the other Tiger sharp-shooters, were held to two points each through the defensive work of the ball-hawking Hillsboro guards, Bob Nolan and Loren Bronkewie.

Hillsboro's second stringers raced to a 17-to-14 win over the junior Tigers in the preliminary game.

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Theatre Team Loses to Portlanders; High Scores Mark Week's Bowling

Portland Rendering company's five-man bowling team took the measure of Hillsboro's Venetian theatre aggregation on the Portland alleys Sunday night close score of 2443 to 2449, in the only out-of-town match scheduled during the past week by the local pin-men.

Some high scores were recorded in city competition last week, with the Pastime Cardroom quartet rolling up a score of 441 pins over their team average. This is the highest that has been rolled over the annual team average in the city of Hillsboro, it was pointed out by Ray Dillon, alley manager. F. Dooher of the Pastime team set a new high mark in a three-game series by smashing out a 705 score, and R. Fairman of the Imperial Cafe team one field goal and four measly points while running up 17 of their own.

F. Dooher took the Perfect Bakery cake award, as well as the C. C. Store necktie prize by virtue of his high scoring for the week. Dooher and Fairman assumed leadership in practically all the races for the various awards. Dooher is in the lead for the Wick award, the John Gardner prize and the Goldleaf Dairy award, while Fairman tops competitors for the Bristol Hardware, Ray J. Mann and Pastime Cardroom awards. W. Patterson went into a tie with Doc Almquist for the Hillsboro Auto parts competition, and the Pastime

Cardroom team held the lead for the Clem's Place prize.

Spartan Crew Trounces Beaver Five

Hilhi's Spartans moved within a gnat's eye-crow of the county league's 1938 title Friday night when they hammered out a 30 to 26 victory over Beaverton's quintet in a rough, hard game. By winning the game, Hillsboro was assured of nothing less than a first-place tie, even though they dropped the two remaining league games scheduled.

The game itself was a rough smashing affair, although only 14 fouls, including seven against each team, were called by Referee Jerry Lillie, but a junior-sized riot following the game produced even more action. The unscheduled fire-works commenced when Beaverton rooters started out to remove a sign depicting the hapless Beaver being beaten by the Spanish axe. Several knockouts were recorded as spectators mixed in a free-for-all before the anticlimactic affair was quelled.

Hilhi led through out the game, thanks largely to the sharpshooting of Forward Bill Grogan, who totalled a dozen points for his evening's efforts. He led in scoring in a second place tie.

In a preliminary game, the youthful Spartans "B" team smashed through to a 28 to 20 win over the Beaverton seconds. Naught pitched in 10 points for Bill Johnson's Hilhi second team.
