

# Hillsboro Five Clinches County League Title by Downning Tigard

## Tigers Fall, 22-15, Before Spartan Five

Hillsboro clinched the 1938 county league crown Tuesday night by coming up with a thrilling 22-to-15 victory over the Tigard quintet in a fast game on the Hills court, but it took the strongest second-half comeback of the year to turn the trick.

Tigard started out with a first-half rush that held Hillsboro Spartans to an unprecedented low score. At the half-time rest period, Tigard led 11 to 5. But the pent-up Spartans came back to turn on full power in the last half of the game, holding the Tigers to one field goal and four mealy points while running up 17 of their own. By trouncing the Tigard five, the Hills quint assured themselves of the league title, regardless of the outcome of the last league tilt with Sherwood.

## Grogan in Lead

In their first meeting of the season, Tigard took a 10-to-9 win from the Spartans in the first game of the county opener program. Later on Hillsboro bounced back to a 17-to-14 win over the junior Tiggers in the preliminary game.

Bill Grogan, named captain for the evening, responded by running up nine points to lead scoring. Lanky Ted Beckham, Tigard center, had eight to his credit when the fireworks were over, but Ashmore and Nunnenkamp, the other Tiger sharpshooters, were held to two points each through the defensive work of the ball-hawking Hillsboro guards, Bob Nolan and Loren Bronleewe.

Hillsboro's second stringers raced to a 17-to-14 win over the junior Tiggers in the preliminary game.

## Spartan Crew Trounces Beaver Five

Hillsboro's Spartans moved within a goat's eyebrow of the county league's 1938 title Friday night when they hammered out a 30 to 26 victory over Beaver's quintet in a rough, hard game. By winning the game, Hillsboro was assured of nothing less than a first-place tie, even though they dropped the two remaining league games scheduled.

The game itself was a rough, smashing affair, although only 14 fouls, including seven against each team, were called by Referee Jerry Little, but a junior-sized riot following the game produced even more action. The unscheduled fireworks commenced when Beaver ton ruckers started out to remove a sign depicting the hapless Beaver being beheaded by the Spagnum axe. Several knockouts were recorded as spectators mixed in a free-for-all while the anticlimatic affair was quelled.

Hillsboro led throughout the game, thanks largely to the sharp-shooting of Forward Bill Grogan, who totalled a dozen points for his evening's efforts. He led in scoring, followed by Gene Brown and Karlstein of Beaverton with nine each. Superiority in converting foul shots gave the Hills men the victory, since the teams were tied in the field goals at 12 apiece. The Spartan crew converted six foul shots in 11 attempts, while the Beavers sank only two in nine tries.

In a preliminary game, the youthful Spartan "B" team smashed through to a 28 to 20 win over the Beaverton crew. The Spartan's 10 points for Bill Johnson's Hills second team.
