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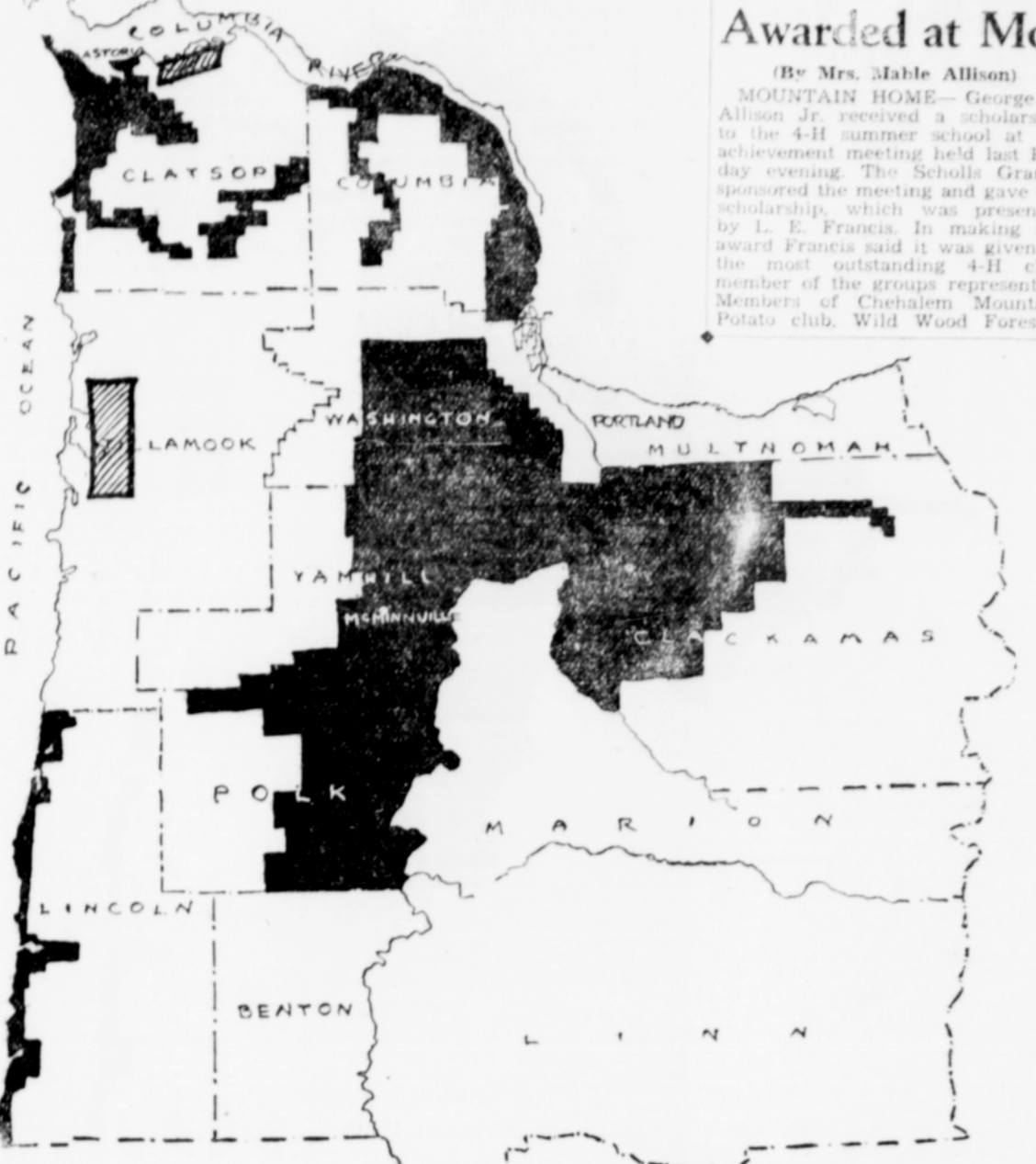
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Map Shows Power District

Unemployed Claims Need Large Force

Two hundred workers in the Salem offices of the state unemployment compensation commission are working on day, night and Sunday shifts in an attempt to catch up on the huge number of claims filed since the first of the year, according to C. L. Hulbert, senior interviewer in charge of Washington county work.

By last week, 12,296 claims had been paid, with 38,108 remaining to be handled. It was stated that "it would take 2000 workers to handle the present number of claims" immediately upon receipt. The fact that about ten per cent of the claims filed require returning for correction also slows down the work. Installation of a new field system is speeding up the work considerably, it was reported.

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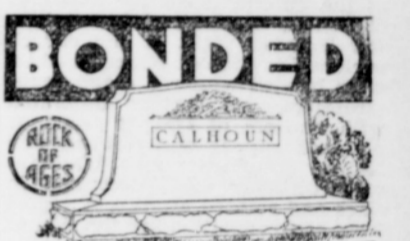
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Play Planned Laurel Hall on March 12
