Mass Declared Not Guilty

Howard Mass, deputy sheriff and son of Sheriff E. T. Mass of Clackamas county, was acquitted of a charge of larceny of public funds by a circuit court jury here late Friday.

Mass' trial, brought here on a change of venue after start of trial proceedings in Oregon City last month, consumed four days in circuit court here. Closing arguments of defense handled by William G. Hare of Hillsboro and Charles T. Sievers, and state, with District Attorney Fred A. Miller of Clackamas county and Francis T. Wade, assistant state attorney general, were concluded late Friday afternoon and the jury retired at 4:35. Vote on the second ballot stood 11 for acquittal and one for conviction. The jury returned the verdict at 8 p. m.

Mass was charged with larceny of \$637 of public funds from Clackamas county. Arguments of the defense contended that no evidence had been presented to prove that anyone "ever stole a cent of Clackamas county money." In final instructions to the jury, Judge Peters stated that a deputy could not be held liable for duties imposed on the sheriff regarding turnover of funds.

Ederer Confesses
Leo B. Ederer of Coos county, who has been held in jail since March 24 on suspicion of having burglarized the Cornelius Feed company that night, admitted the act to Sheriff John W. Connell and District Attorney G. Russell Morgan last week after calling them to the jail to make the confession. He pleaded guilty in circuit court Friday.

Clyde Birch, who pleaded guilty to a reckless driving charge, was fined \$25 and costs in justice court here by Judge A. W. Havens last week. Gilman Satrum was fined \$5 and costs for hauling logs without a county permit Saturday.

Pleading guilty to three counts, Philbin F. Moon was fined \$8 and costs for operating an overloaded truck, \$10 and costs for operating without a PUC permit, and \$2 and costs for working without a chauffeur's license, when he appeared in justice court Tuesday.

C. C. Hedrick, Metzger, reported to sheriff's office Thursday that someone had entered his home last week and taken a gold necklace, gold wrist-watch, and two 12-gauge shotguns, one a double barreled affair. Entrance was made through the front door by means of a pass-key, deputies who investigated said.

Orville Hart, 26, arrested Friday by State Policemen Hadfield and Sheridan, was booked in county jail on a charge of destruction of personal property.

Frederick A. Kolstrum, indicted by the grand jury on counts of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor, and using a car without consent of the owner, waived time and plead guilty to both charges in circuit court Friday. Sentence was postponed until some time in the future and

in the meantime he was allowed liberty on conditions of refraining from liquor, making restitution to the car owner, and starting work immediately.
