Linfield President Gives Monday Talk

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The idea of marching on into Manchuria Russia stopped the Japanese at that time.

"Thus Japan was left with some terrible problems," the educator declared. "No markets and no raw materials made new territory necessary. So economic needs became the great reason for what Japan is doing today—seeking new territory. A secondary reason was the fact that other nations had set the example of annexing new lands. In 1910 Korea was annexed. Then in recent years, Manchuria was taken over and renamed Manchukuo."

"In all probability, China would have been fairly content to allow Japan to take Manchuria, had they stopped at the Great Wall," Anderson opined. "China had been grossly mismanaged, with internal wars indicating its great weakness, but in the past few years changed greatly to a unified nation."

China Unified

"Last year," the retiring Linfield head said, "China was more unified than the United States. Under leadership of Chiang Kai Chek, who recently became a Christian, China was under a dictator who used only the most democratic methods. Unlike other dictator-ruled countries, the Chinese can kick and fuss and criticize—because that's what Chiang wants. With China growing stronger day by day, the Japanese saw that within another year they would not be able to conquer the Chinese. That was the reason for the outbreak of hostilities there in July 1937, as Japan seeks more territory for greater imperial expansion."

cases, non-continguous would resemble a checkerboard.

16,960 Voters Eligible

In Washington county, 45 of the county's 50 precincts will conduct the election, with several of them divided by the arbitrary line of the power district. Forest Grove's three precincts will not be involved, inasmuch as they are now served by a municipal power plant, and Timber's precinct lies entirely outside the boundaries. A total of 16,960 voters in the county are eligible to voice their opinion on an official ballot, with prospects for a fairly heavy vote appearing good.

Six candidates seek election to the five director posts in the event the district is formed. In addition to J. E. Lewton, Forest Grove fruit farmer and power hobbyist, the list includes R. W. Hogg, Polk county fruit grower; Ernest M. Reynolds, Lincoln county realtor; Orlen Royce, Seaside filling station proprietor; George W. Thieson, of Clackamas county, and the well known Peter Zimmerman, former state senator from Yamhill county. Lewton, one of the original power enthusiasts of the county, was chairman of the county Pomona Grange committee which first set machinery in motion for the district more than five years ago.

In his letter, Mott declared of Lewton "In my opinion he is one of the best informed men in Oregon on power questions, as well as one of the most hard-working and energetic." He also stated "As one of the co-authors of the Bonneville-Dam authority bill, I am very much interested in people's power districts, which are being organized for the purpose of enabling the people living in those districts to avail themselves of the power to be generated at this great federal project, and I would like to see the

people's power districts directed by local men whose experience and study have qualified them for this task."

Proponents Hold Meet

Proponents for formation of the utility district met last night (Wednesday) in the union high school auditorium to hear Judge Clarence W. Gilbert, formerly of the court of domestic relations in Multnomah county, and Ray W. Gill, state grange master, talked for the district.

Speakers urged formation of the district in the best interests of the people and backed it as an evidence of widespread interest in the grange's public power program, which has been sponsored by grangers for several decades in the northwest.

Cornelius Opposes

Issued yesterday by a city committee made up of nearly all Cornelius city council members was a letter stating "We are recommending a no vote on this proposition, giving as reasons 'There is no possible good to be gained by city in joining in this proposition at this time. Better wait until the Bonneville question is settled.'"

You will vote a tax on all property in the district which is without any return to you. You will vote yourself into a perpetual corporation with no possible way of getting out. There is no assurance of lower rates." The letter concluded with the plea: "Don't let them put this over on you. It is not to the interest of the city to go into this at this time."

The statement went out over the signatures of Council Members J. A. Irnier, George Holscher, O. C. Charney and Ray P. Shaw, and City Recorder D. C. Whiting, and Byron Mosberry, ex-mayor.

Gale Grange, usually a strong-hold for State Master Gill, turned

thumbs down on the state head and his candidacy for re-election to that post at a meeting last week-end, and then proceeded to unanimously vote to table a letter directing passage of a resolution endorsing the utility district.

Ralph W. Perry of Hood River received the grange endorsement in the grange primaries, while Albert Slaughter and Morton Tompkins, other members of the Gill triumvirate, were defeated. "Extravagance of the present grange administration" was blamed for part of the change in feeling together with political manipulation and closed columns of the Grange Bulletin.
