tions of the proposed district which actually cast favorable ballots was termed a legal question by Charles E. Stricklin, commission secretary, and referred to the attorney-general.

Some have taken it to mean that any unit giving the proposal a majority vote would be a part of the district, but the "checkboarded" condition of the map following the voting was thought to be too much of a damper to declare any district formed at present.

Tupper Gives Figures
Official county totals for the election were released yesterday by County Clerk W. A. Tupper following completion of the canvass conducted following the voting. Yes votes totaled 2281, with 4102 negative ballots listed. City votes for

all municipalities of the county were 284 yes and 1446 no.

Weevil Control Problems Under Discussion at Farmer Meeting

Dusting field peas with a rotenone dust, careful timing of the application of this dust using dusting machinery equipped with a hood, and prompt handling and fumigation of the entire pea seed crop were important recommendations developed at the conference in the county agent's office last Thursday night of growers intending to equip dusting machinery, dealers, and representatives of the Federal Department of Agriculture and the Oregon Experiment station.

For two years work has been carried on locally as well as in eastern Oregon and the Seapoint section, in the use of rotenone dust in controlling weevil in the canner pea crop. The same material has been tried in a limited way on the Austrian field pea seed crop. The use of this dust on the canner peas has proven so effective that the entire local acreage of canner peas will be dusted. Along with these recommendations as to handling the weevil situation which call for definite action the coming season a "sanitary" program is also of importance. Plowing fields that have been in canner peas as soon as the crop is harvested and burning all the refuse left in the field is desirable practice, which if decreasing the infestation another year. The same care in cleaning up what is left of peas in the home vegetable garden will benefit both the canner and seed pea industry in this county, says County Agent Cyrus.

Information gained in combating weevil in canner peas points the way for control effort on the seed pea crop. The work of the past two years has established certain facts and it is on those facts that recommendations for the coming season were discussed and developed at last week's meeting. To aid the growers in timing their applications of dust an entomologist will be located at Forest Grove, who will be constantly in the field checking the weevil infestation. This information regarding proper time to dust will be available at the Forest Grove office, which will be in the Miller building with L. P. Rockwood, Forest Grove Extension station, starting there for a number of years. Also the county agent's office in the court house in Hillsboro, will serve as another contact point.

Dusts carrying three-fourths of one per cent rotenone have been used, found effective, and are recommended. The past two years the materials used have carried rotenone from both the cube plant and the derris plant. Mr. Gray and Mr. Chamberlin, in checking the results for two years, found that there wasn't any difference in the effectiveness of the two materials, they told the growers Thursday evening.

Some dusting has been done without hoods. When there is no breeze this may prove satisfactory. From experience, both locally and in eastern Oregon, it seems definite however, that putting a canvas hood on a boom arrangement, extending out on either side of the dusting unit, will save the amount of material that is put on, without depending on completely on weather conditions, and that a more accurate application of dust may be made.
