Judge M. C. Summers of California presented the money question as it relates to our nation in an effective way at the meeting of the new Grange hall Monday evening sponsored by the Hillsboro Grange. Judge Summers presented the subject from the standpoint of present laws which allow international bankers to control the nation's money instead of the congress of the United States. He decried the idea that this nation could ever borrow herself back into prosperity.

In a fervent way he contrasted the present system of finance with the proposed general welfare act embodying the Townsend plan of recovery. He declared it to be for the benefit of local bankers, business men and labor and a sure way to recovery without a penny of expense to the government.
