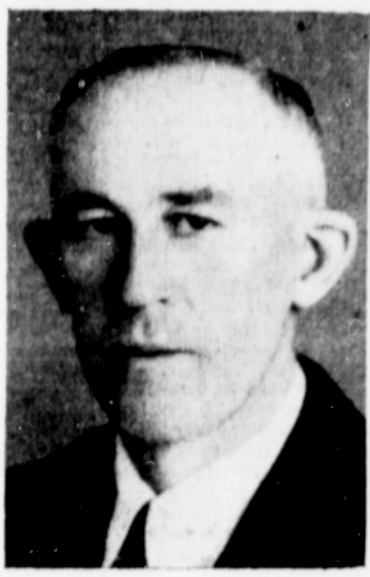

County Herds Have Two Leading
Cows in Entire State for March

Oregon's two highest producing cows during the month of March, according to official figures released by Agricultural Extension department of dairy production, were owned by Washington county herds. Baromet's Peggy, owned by David Hagg & Sons of Reedville, a purebred Jersey, produced 1358 pounds of milk and 92.3 pounds of fat to lead, while Goldie, a grade Jersey of the Brodgen Acres herd, produced 1442 pounds of milk and 90.8 pounds of fat during the month.

High producing dairy herd of the county for the month of March was the 21-cow outfit of John W. Mulloy, which produced an average of 898 pounds of milk and 43.66 pounds of fat, according to the official monthly report by Tester Freeman Dull.

During the month, 934 cows were tested in the Washington county association, with the total average reaching 573 pounds of milk and 32.39 pounds of fat per cow. Cows producing over 40 pounds of fat numbered 398. High herd in the state that of R. B. Rylander, in Coquille valley, had the unusually high average of 55.5 pounds of fat produced in a 24-cow herd.

With completion of March testing, Washington county's herd association will nearly double in size, with addition of 799 cows belonging to 34 herds, and Hal VanHouten, new tester who will carry on work in conjunction with Dull. The March report on 934 cows was from the 31 members of the smaller association.

Efficiency Virtue
Of Dictators,
Speaker Declares

"Efficiency in government is perhaps the only advantage dictatorial governments hold over ours," William J. Mazzocco, around-the-world traveler and student, told members of the Rotary club Thursday.

"To begin with, there is no wrangling over laws under a dictator. No congress can debate for weeks or carry on filibusters, because the dictator, with his all-inclusive powers, is able to issue an edict affecting the whole country," he said. "Then, too, there is only one party in any of the dictator countries. In Germany, you must be a Nazi. In Italy, you either belong to the Fascist party or you don't belong to any."

Voting Style Unique

"Methods of Italian voting are unique when compared to ours. The voter marks one 'X' which does for 400 candidates—all at one stroke. If you vote affirmatively, you use a blue ballot. If you vote negatively, you deposit a red or yellow ballot in the box. Since there is a Fascist black-shirt standing directly before the box, watching all voters, it is rather difficult for the average man to cast a negative vote."

Mazzocco, who returned recently from a nine months' trip through Southern Europe, Egypt, India and the Orient, declared that one thing very noticeable in Europe is the atmosphere of hate in various countries. By merely crossing a border the traveler finds a different people, speaking a different language, and usually hereditary enemies of the adjacent nation, he observed.

The Greek government's novel idea in adding to the quantity of money proved particularly interesting Mazzocco said. Finding themselves in need of additional cash for government expenditures, officials called in all paper money, and rather than set off on an uncontrolled inflation spree, clipped each note in half, stamped each one with government approval, and set them back in circulation, using the half gained for the official fund.

Japan Not United

Contrary to usual reports, Mazzocco declared he did not find the Japanese strongly united in their war against China. He spent more than a month in the principal cities of Japan, and said that during his time there a large number of leading citizens, together with some government officials and educators, had been arrested for persisting in their pacifist agitation. Throughout the country this spirit of division of thought was very noticeable, he said.

Mazzocco, who spoke two weeks ago at a chamber of commerce meeting, visited the B. W. Barnes junior high school after the Rotary meeting Thursday at the invitation of School Superintendent J. W. Poynter and addressed the students there, displaying a number of Italian textbooks and several models of foreign headgear, including some from Italy, Switzerland and Turkey.

R. R. Easter was program chairman, introducing the speaker and making a plea for support of American youth programs which build up a resistant spirit to encroachment of such schemes and ideals as are found abroad.

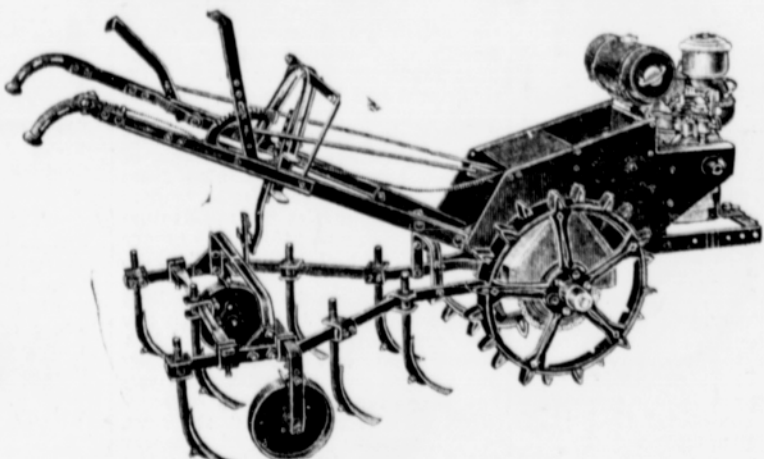
