Consolidated School Topic At North Plains Meeting

NORTH PLAINS—Much interest is being shown in possibilities of a consolidated school since its advantages were presented at the P. T. A. meeting last Tuesday evening. County School Superintendent O. B. Kraus presented the assessed valuations of two neighboring districts, their school census and the probable expenditures under consolidations. Since there is no indebtedness on the North Plains school and there would be no need of a building program, he said, there was a perfect set up for a three or four-room school by including one or two of the neighboring districts with a 19 mills tax in one case and a 3.2 mills tax in the second arrangement.

He also pointed out the advantages of a four-room school over a one-room school. When a teacher has eight grades to teach she can spend only about 45 minutes with each grade and that is not adequate time to teach all the subjects that grades should have. The problem of children adjusting themselves socially would be greatly improved if included in the children's learning, he said. Anyone interested in this consolidation program can get statistics from Mr. Kraus' office or from Mrs. Chamberlain.
