

Local Luncheon Forums Unique Officers Say

Hillsboro's chamber of commerce forums luncheons are among the most successful conducted in the state, it was learned at the two-day conference of commercial secretaries held at McArthur court, University of Oregon, Eugene, Monday and Tuesday, attended by Leon S. Davis, local chamber secretary.

It was revealed in the course of discussion of luncheon forums that many cities of the state do not have weekly meetings, although all secretaries agreed that presentation of educational speakers at such meetings is of great value and is to be sought in preparing chamber of commerce programs.

Relationship of chamber of commerce to land settlement and land advertising was held up as an important feature of present work. More truth must be used in this type of advertising, it was declared. Speakers pointed out that "boom" advertising has brought undesirable and impoverished people to the state, thus creating a problem rather than a credit to Oregon. Direct contact was decided upon as means to bring more industry to Oregon to take up slack in employment occasioned by presence of this type of immigrant.
