ALOKA—James Welch, 63, died May 22. Funeral services by Christian Science were held at the Aloha Grange hall May 25 and arrangements were in charge of W. E. Pegg Chapel, Beaverton. Spanish-American War Veterans, State Department of Oregon, had charge of the services at the grave. Interment was in Crescent Grove cemetery, Beaverton.

He was born in Mercer County, Pa., came to Oregon in 1903 and had been a resident of Hillsboro since 1921. He was a member of Sharon Lodge 398 K. of P. for 36 years, Scout Harrington Camp Spanish-American War Veterans of Hillsboro, and for 43 years a member of the international Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

Estabrook Jury Fails to Agree

Defense Attorney, C. T. Tanner of Portland and Neal Bush of Hillsboro were midway through their arguments when the halt was called.

Monday saw the windup of the case, with the jury retiring to deliberate at 3:07 p. m. Tuesday morning the jury requested further instruction on the question of an accomplice in the bombing, and received further consideration. When it became evident that the jurors were unable to agree upon any verdict, they were discharged shortly before noon Tuesday by Judge Peters.

Special prosecutor Ralph Moody had characterized Estabrook as a ring-leader in the campaign of terrorism, and indicated that he might be involved in other acts of violence. Defense attorneys Tanner maintained that the state had been unable to corroborate testimony by Melvin Bozarth and Leon W. Wallingford, Estabrook's alleged partners in the bombing, against the defendant.

Second trial for Estabrook will probably be set for some time late in June, it was opened yesterday.

F. W. Barber, 70, Dies at Cornelius

Fred W. Barber, 70, died at his home in Cornelius Tuesday following a three months' illness. Funeral services will be held this afternoon (Thursday) from the Cornelius Methodist Episcopal church with Elder Wilcox of Loredalewood officiating. Interment will be in Cornelius cemetery.

Born in Wisconsin, November 27, 1867, Mr. Barber came to Oregon in 1888 and lived up farming near Cornelius. He retired several years ago and had lived at the same place for the past 40 years.
