CORNELIUS—Word was received Tuesday of the death of Earl E. Smith May 30 at Bushnell, Neb., at the home of his mother. Mr. Smith went east some time ago to consult his family doctor and to attend to some business. Ill health prevented his return.

Mrs. Smith and son Ivan left Tuesday evening by train for funeral arrangements there.

Mr. Smith was born in Illinois November 21, 1881, and was married to Lela Katon, February 2, 1907, at Montesano, Wash. The family came to Oregon from Nebraska, settling in Cornelius in 1923.

He leaves his widow and sons, Seth of Hillsboro, and Glen, Kenneth and Ivan of Cornelius. His eldest son, Lester, died in 1932. He is also survived by his aged mother, Mrs. J. E. Road Oiling Work Begins Thursday

Washington county's summer program of road oiling got under way this morning (Thursday), with about 25 miles of roadway throughout the county to be treated during the next two weeks, according to County Engineer J. W. Barney.

Oiling began in the Tigard district, and will work westward through the county and wind up on roads west of Forest Grove.

Barney said about 20 miles of roads will be treated with light oil, while the additional five miles will be sprinkled with a heavier type oil.

Laying of non-skid top chip paving on three miles of the Gaston-Forest Grove highway began Wednesday morning with the Oregon state highway commission handling the work.

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Camp Ireland Fund Approved

Approval of an allocation of \$2000 WPA fund by President Roosevelt for development of Camp Ireland on McKay creek north of Hillsboro was announced this week, according to word received here from Washington, D. C.

Donated for use of Hillsboro district Boy Scouts several months ago by Mrs. Elizabeth Milne Ireland of Portland, the camp site will soon be developed with the aid of WPA labor, according to R. R. Easter, scout district commissioner. The work will include clearing of grounds, cleaning the creek and construction of a dam and a large pow-wow shelter.

The grant still has to be approved by the comptroller-general in Washington before being authorized. After that, and when official notification is received here, work on the camp will begin.
