

State's Benefit Payment Total \$730,102 in May

SALEM—May distribution of benefit checks to jobless workers insured under the state unemployment compensation law found the Portland metropolitan area maintaining its 45 per cent at the top of the list for the third consecutive month. Checks totaled \$827,511 and the state total was \$730,102.

Washington, Columbia and portions of Clackamas county, all served liberally from Portland, are included in the metropolitan area. Eugene's \$229,253 was next high. The Lane county total accounted for 7 per cent of the entire disbursements. Ontario and The Dalles continued to battle it out for low honors. Ontario now has received \$24,007 for 3 per cent and The Dalles \$28,274 for 3 per cent.

At last count, Manager Dillon had seven carnival rides, two shows, 13 concessions, 12 refreshment booths, two pony rides and a novelty ball game signed for the show. Browning Brothers Amusement company of Salem will again be present with an enlarged show, he said. Efforts are being made by the firemen's committee to confine all performers and shows at the "Happy Days" this year to Oregon-owned and operated concerns.

At least three baseball games will be put on during the celebration for the enjoyment of sports fans.
