

Two Local Loan Groups Set New Dividends

Washington Savings & Loan association and Tualatin Valley Federal Savings & Loan association, both operated in the Savings & Loan building in Hillsboro, have just declared their regular semi-annual dividend on savings accounts at the rate of four per cent per annum. This is the 26th consecutive semi-annual dividend for the Washington Savings & Loan association, which was organized in Hillsboro in 1925 and has maintained an unbroken record of dividend payments on savings accounts since that date.

The Tualatin Valley Federal Savings & Loan association, a federally chartered institution, was organized to gain the advantages offered by a federal institution and is under the same management and the same board of directors as the other association with an additional three members.

Construction Noted

J. M. Person, general manager of both institutions, states that the savings and loan business has been making great gains in the past two years. During the first six months of 1938, more new home construction was financed by the associations than during any other six-month period in their history.

"While there still remains an unprecedented housing shortage," stated Person, "we are unable to determine at this time what effect the general recession of business may have on home construction. One unusual aspect of home construction during the past year and a half has been the almost total lack of construction of homes for sale. Owner-occupied homes of more than the usual superiority have been the practice this far."

The associations not only finance Washington county homes, but also make loans in St. Helens and in Yamhill county. Boards of directors are made up of the following: J. M. Person, George G.
