New Herd Association Section Takes High Award in First Month

Twenty-four more dairy herds were added to the number tested in Washington county last month, as the recently formed second division of the county dairy herd improvement association began its work under Hal Van Houten, tester. Figure both old and new sections of the association, 1330 cows were tested during the month from 31 herds, representing the third largest association in the state at present.

Top honors for high producing herd were annexed by a member of the new division, with Vic Foster's herd averaging 43.5 pounds of fat. The J. C. Aydelott herd, also one of the new herds in the association, tested 43 pounds fat average to come second in the county. Hiatt and Hammond had the high producing cow for the month in the new group, with "Queen," purebred Jersey, producing 966 pounds of milk containing 74.4 pounds of fat, and T. B. Denney had second high cow, "Golden," a grade Jersey, producing 1470 pounds of milk and 70.6 pounds of fat. All told, Van Houten reported testing 483 cows in the 24 herds. Average milk production in the new group was 617, with 30 pounds fat, and 116 cows of 40 pounds or more average.

In the original section, the L. T. Sills herd was high with 42.91 pounds of fat average. Freeman Dull, tester in charge, reported 847 cows tested, averaging 711 pounds of milk and 33.14 pounds of fat, with 288 cows making the 40 pound average rank. C. B. Buchanan, Jr., had the high producing cow of the month, "Melissa," purebred Jersey, producing 1620 pounds of milk containing 85.9 pounds of fat, while Mrs. Tom Williams had the second rank cow, "Diana," another purebred Jersey, producing 1524 pounds of milk and 85.5 pounds of fat.
