To Give Air Picture of Coronation



Art Kirkham, veteran KOIN announcer, will describe the coronation of the 1938 Goddess of Liberty at the grand ball which marks the opening of the annual Hillsboro "Happy Days" celebration next Friday evening from 9:30 to 10 p. m. It will mark the first time that any community event of its kind, aside from the Portland Rose Festival, has ever been broadcast in Oregon.

KOIN to Carry Kirkham's Radio Picture of Friday Coronation

Promptly at 9:30 Friday night, Hillsboro will witness its first remote control radio broadcast of a "Happy Days" feature when the coronation of the Goddess of Liberty is described over the air by the popular Art Kirkham of KOIN, which will carry the program. Kirkham, already a popular figure in Washington county as a result of his frequent speaking appearances in various communities, will be appearing for the first time in his regular role of announcer. For the past ten years he has been closely identified with KOIN, having joined the staff of that station in pioneer days of broadcasting in 1928 as announcer. Airing of the goddess ceremony Friday evening will be in line with Kirkham's favorite type of broadcast, which he termed "informal feature programs." His duties will more closely resemble those of a master-of-ceremonies than a regular announcer.

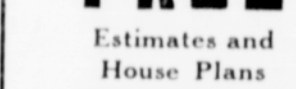

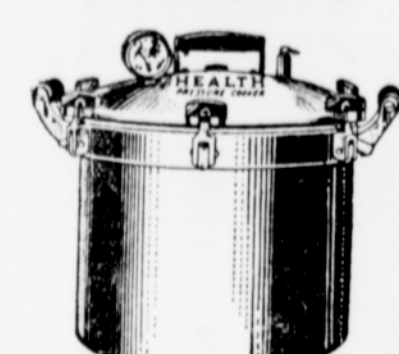
