

Young Peoples' Status Shown By Study Report

"Older young people" in rural areas in Oregon between the ages of 16 and 25 years numbered approximately 75,000 at the time of the last general census, about half of whom are out of school and unmarried. The study report, prepared by the United States department of agriculture, shows that the rural young people have recently been studied as a joint effort of the national and state co-operative extension service at Oregon State college, and the mimeographed report of the study issued by the United States department of agriculture.

Bernard D. Joy, former Jackson county boy who is now agriculturalist at Washington, D. C., in the division of extension studies, and teaching, and J. R. Beck, rural service specialist at Oregon State college, are authors of this first report ever made on older rural youth in Oregon.

Majority High Graduates
Eighty-nine per cent of the out-of-school youth in Oregon interviewed in the study had not entered their chosen vocation. While only 24 per cent of this age group are continuing in school, 68 per cent of the out-of-school youth were high school graduates.

It has frequently been said that the young men and women in this age group had for the most part passed beyond contacts with 4-H clubs or Smith-Hughes work and had not yet found places in regular adult organizations. The extent to which this is true was clearly indicated in the Oregon survey, where it was found that although 65 per cent of the young people interviewed in this study had been members of 4-H clubs, only 10 per cent were then associated with the extension service, and 78 per cent of the out-of-school youth had no memberships in organizations except those associated with the church.

Aid to Employment Seen in System

Administrator J. D. Ross' plan for a superpower network to connect Bonneville dam with Portland, the Willamette valley and Eastern Oregon will mean employment and electricity for thousands of Oregonians, he declared this week.

Figures released by Ross showed that the proposed \$21,375,725 construction program, for which he has applied to PWA Head Harold L. Ickes, would mean more than seven million man-hours of direct labor. Manufacture of the materials and equipment used would add many more millions of hours to the total. Construction of the network will stimulate building of rural distribution systems, and low-cost power will open a huge market for electrical appliances.
