Portland Youth Drowns

Waters of the Tualatin river at Roamers Rest near Tigard claimed the life of Keith Stone, 14-year-old Portland youth, Sunday morning, 7:30 p. m. Saturday, according to Coroner Fred J. Sewell.

The youth was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Stone of 403 N. Stanton street, Portland. He lost his life while diving. After several hours of unsuccessful grappling for the body, it was finally recovered by a Portland diver in 18 feet of water. Report of the death was not turned in to Washington county authorities until Monday. Funeral services are to be held in Portland for young Stone.

Hillsboro Man Hurt

Fern Baker of Hillsboro and Glen Moniel, an occupant in Baker's car, were sent to Jones hospital early Sunday morning after the machine in which they were riding sideswiped the car of Fred Koberstein of Gaston on the road near Scoggins Valley junction. The sheriff's report revealed this week.

Impact of the collision sent the Baker car into the ditch at left of the road where occupants were jammed and bruised. Richard and Norman Blaine, other occupants of the Baker car, were uninjured.

Berton Davidson, route 1, Grandview, Wash., reported his car was damaged Sunday when he was forced to swerve from the road at the Rock Creek service station where the car he was following turned off the road suddenly without signaling. The turning car was registered to Finley U. Peterman of route 2, Box 296.

Reedville Corner Dangerous

REEDVILLE, July 6.—Cars driven by Lafayette Golt and an unidentified driver from Michigan crashed at the Harry Bear filling station corner here late Saturday afternoon. No one was seriously injured, damage being confined to wrecked automobiles.

At different times during the past few years several serious accidents have taken place at this corner. No solution for the collisions has been presented as yet.

A second crash took place at the same corner shortly after 10 a. m. Sunday when a car driven by H. S. Rogers Jr. of Hillsboro, failed to stop at the highway when coming off a crossroad and plunged across the pavement and 300 feet beyond off the road. Rogers and another occupant of his car declared they did not realize they were so close to the main highway and that they did not see the stop sign. They were unable to stop the car until it was off the road.

Cornelius Couple Hurt

CORNELIUS, July 6.—Mr. and Mrs. Ed Bietelsch were injured in an automobile accident five miles this side of Vernonia last Sunday evening when the brake on a front wheel locked and sent their car into the ditch while they were returning from a week-end outing. Bietelsch was thrown against the steering wheel and suffered a severely bruised chest and several broken ribs, while his wife struck the top of the car, sustaining a bruised forehead. Relatives following them discovered the accident and took them to a Hillsboro doctor, later returning them to their home here.

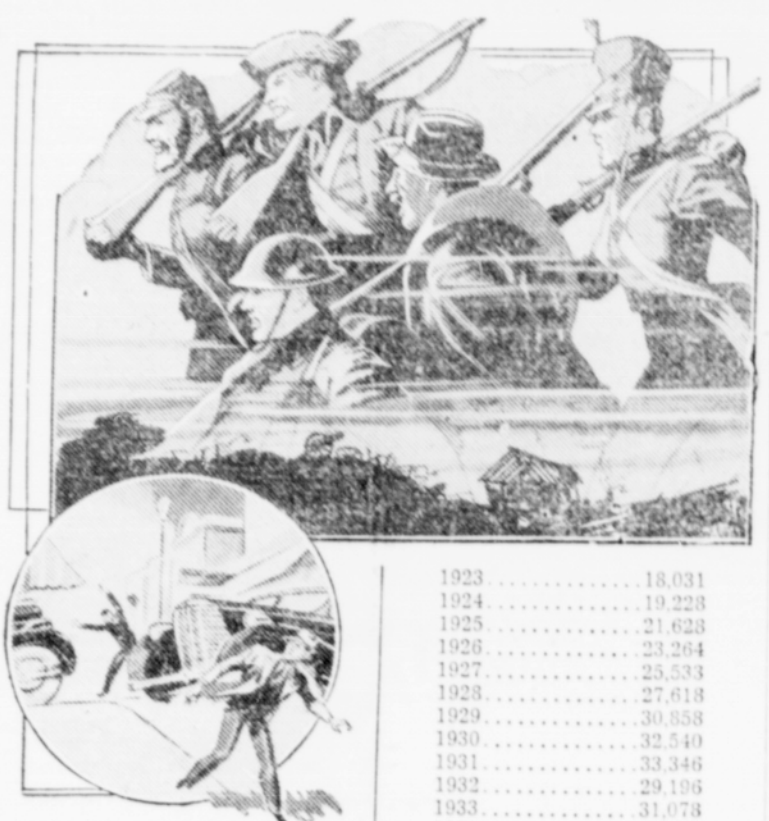

Increase Due in California Cars

Twenty-five per cent more California cars may be seen on the highways of Oregon and the northwest this vacation season as a result of a demand for shorter vacations, the Oregon State Motor association has been advised by Don Daig, touring authority for the Automobile Club of Southern California.

California motorists who, under more promising economic conditions, travel far eastward are altering their plans in order to remain closer to home base. Daig pointed out. His organization reported a tremendous increase in requests for information on this area.

"Few business executives want to be so far away from their office that they can't jump back into the middle of things should they receive an S. O. S. signal," he said.

"The northwest provides an opportunity for them to spend a pleasant vacation on less money and within easy reach."

Although the A. A. A. touring department in Oregon reports an increase in directional information, non-resident registration figures compiled by Earl Snell, secretary of state, show a slump in the number of visitors during the months of March, April and May. The total for the first five months of this year, however, is 53 per cent above the same period in 1937.

Tire failures are a prolific cause of traffic accidents and deaths during summer months, when high speeds and hot pavings combine to build up undue temperatures and pressures in automobile tires, according to Secretary of State Earl Snell. He advises motorists to check inflation at frequent intervals, and to refrain from using tires worn to the fabric on long drives.
