O. J. McMahon was a Portland visitor three days last week. The neighborhood is more lively since many men are home from the lumber mills and camps for a ten-day vacation.

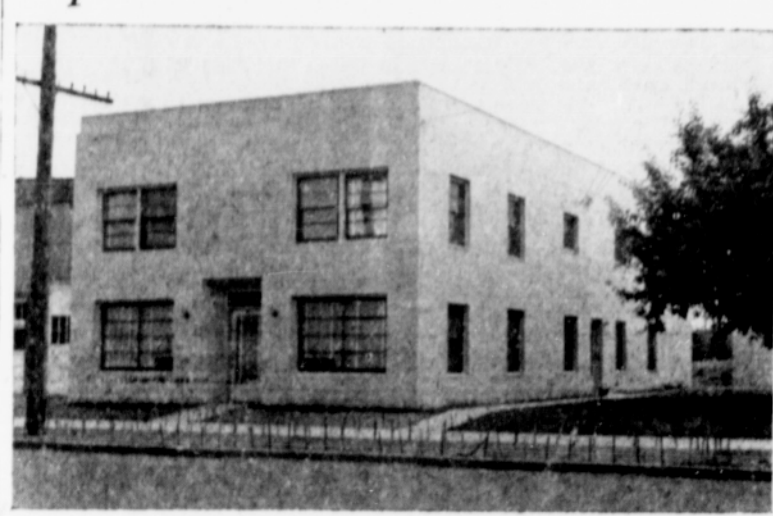

Dr. Nicol, Hillsboro Veterinarian, Opens New Hospital; Ten Years Experience Covers Wide Field



Hillsboro's New Veterinary Hospital

Hillsboro can now boast one of the finest all-around veterinary hospitals on the entire Pacific coast. Completed several weeks ago, it is the new Nicol building at 168 North Third avenue, and was recently occupied by Dr. R. J. Nicol and his associates, Dr. E. W. Almquist and Dr. R. L. Bean.

Built for Dr. Nicol by Adolph Mohr, Hillsboro contractor, the new building includes nine rooms on the first floor devoted to veterinary use, making it one of the largest and most modern of its kind in the country. The new setup includes a reception room, two offices, a drug department, two animal surgeries, a "ward" for small animals, and a furnace and storage room. On the second floor are two apartments, one used by Dr. Nicol and the other by Dr. Bean.

The new building is the third location occupied by Dr. Nicol since he came to Hillsboro nearly 10 years ago in September, 1928. Although the building is completed and already in full use, there is a large amount of new veterinary equipment which, when it arrives and is installed, will give the local veterinarians the very latest for treatment of all animals.

Served in Army Corps
Born in North Dakota, Dr. Nicol came to Oregon at the age of two, and was raised in Marion county. He began study of veterinary science at University of California in Berkeley, and was graduated from San Francisco Veterinary college in 1918. Immediately afterwards he enlisted in the medical corps of the army and was transferred to the Veterinary corps, the first company of its kind ever formed in the United States army.

After preliminary training in Georgia, he was assigned to sanitary duty, which involved inspection of all meats and foods, in addition to medical care of army horses.

Following his army experiences, Nicol practiced in McMinnville for eight years. In 1928 he purchased Western Oregon is one of the least troubled areas in the whole United States with regard to animal diseases. Cattle here are rarely troubled with anthrax, black-leg or many of the other diseases that raise havoc with herds. Hog cholera is rare, according to Dr. Nicol, and this fact, coupled with favorable raising conditions, indicate that many more hogs could be raised in Oregon. At present, many are shipped in from the eastern states to satisfy Oregon demand, while California also offers an excellent market.

ket if more hogs could be produced for out-of-state use, he said.

Wide Variety Treated

"The largest animal I ever treated was an elephant," Dr. Nicol related. "I removed a splinter from his leg. And the smallest was a canary—I operated on its crop."

Work of the three veterinarians in Washington county includes practically all phases of animal treatment. Inspection of meats forms a part of the work, with much of the meat butchering in county slaughter houses for use in Portland being inspected, in addition to all meats used at the Haley Cannery and Fred's Superior market in Hillsboro. Everything from sanitary inspection of barns to treatment of horses, cows and pigs takes place during the course of the year. The 30 thoroughbred horses at the Hawthorne Stud, H. W. Ray Stables on Hillsboro route 4, are among the choice clients of the veterinarian trio.

Nicol's new building gives about four times as much working space as the former hospital. The new building is a complete "drug store" where preparations for treatment of animals and prescriptions are filled in a sanitary kennel room for small animals kept at the hospital. A large operating room for small animals, and a specially-constructed stack for use in operating on larger animals.

Many of the ideas incorporated in the new building were discovered by Dr. Nicol on his trip to Hawaii several months ago. While there he visited with a former classmate, Dr. Lloyd C. Moss, who operates a similar hospital in Honolulu. A number of Moss' improvements were taken over and included in plans for the Nicol building.

Mrs. Thomas West, who has been ill for several months, died at her home Saturday evening.

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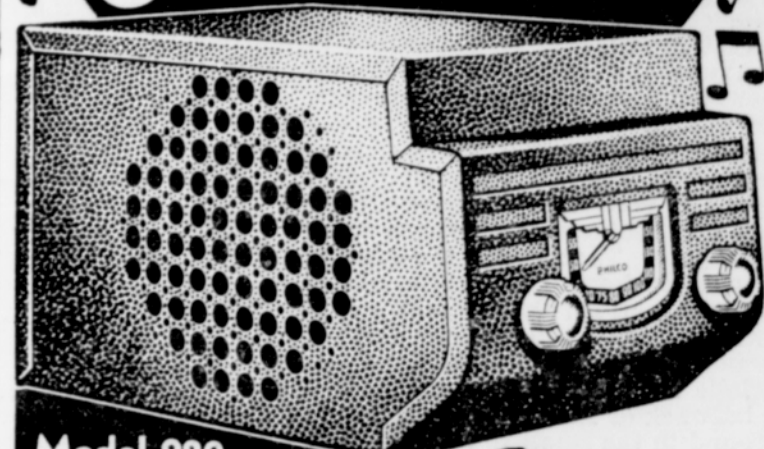
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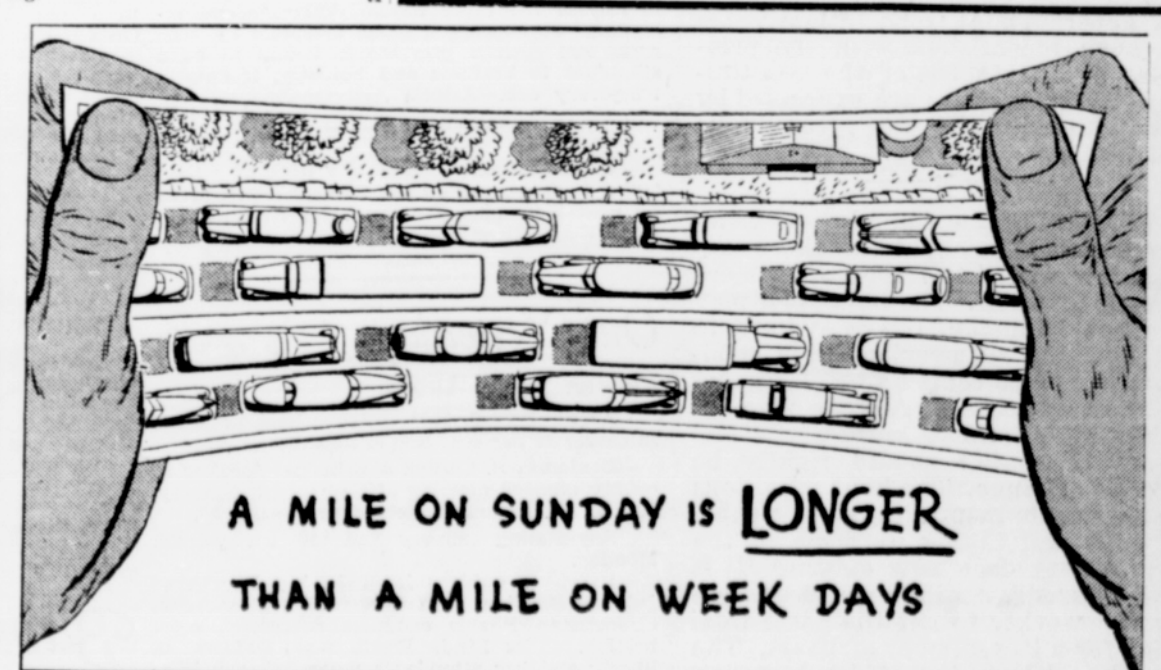
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
