Picture Endorsed By Christian Council

The Hillsboro Christian Council, through Pastor Henry S. Haller, advisor, calls attention to the motion picture currently playing at the Hill theatre, and urges attendance at its showing. The statement, issued on behalf of the Legion of Decency, recalls that Erich Maria Remarque, author of "Three Comrades," the book from which Scott Fitzgerald adapted the screen play of the same name, has within the past two weeks been deprived of his citizenship by the German government because of his writings.

"The philosophy of Erich Maria Remarque regarding war, which the German government thinks so objectionable, is, in our opinion, not at all at variance with the Christian philosophy," says the Legion of Decency statement. To understand Remarque's philosophy is, also, by comparison, to understand the Nazi philosophy on the same subject. Thinking Christians will welcome this opportunity to see the portrayal of "Three Comrades" as they welcome "All Quiet on the Western Front," by the same author.

WHAT IS MEANT BY "REACTION DISTANCE?"

"Reaction distance" is the distance traveled by an automobile during the time required by the driver to notice danger ahead and to apply his foot to the brake. This distance varies according to the speed of the car and the driver's quickness. If the car is traveling 30 miles an hour and the driver applies the brake one second after perceiving danger, the car will move only 44 feet before the brakes begin to take hold but if the car is traveling 60 miles an hour, and the driver is so slow or indecisive that three seconds elapse before he applies the brake, the car will travel 264 feet, or nearly an entire city block, before braking begins. It is always well to take into consideration this "reaction distance" as well as the actual braking distance when you are calculating how quickly you can stop.
