Walker, former principal of Inanda Seminary in the province of Natal, Miss Walker, whose school was founded in 1909, writes that the color bar is more in force in Natal than in any other part of the Union of South Africa, although only 1 out of every 3 persons is white. Inanda Seminary has a present enrollment of nearly 200 Bantu girls.
