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J. Mohr Returns From Two Months Visit in Canada

Jacob Mohr, well-known building contractor, returned Saturday from more than two months' visit with relatives in Canada. He visited his daughter, Mrs. A. Purvis, and family at Edmonton, his brother, Philip Mohr, on a farm at Josephburg where he spent the most of his time; a sister in Calgary, a sister in Edmonton, and a brother in Winnipeg, besides numerous nieces and other relatives.

Mr. Mohr says that labor troubles are as bad if not worse there than here. Edmonton, however, is having a building boom, with new business buildings going up for the Huguenot Bay company, Kresge company, and the Eaton Co., similar to Montgomery Ward. Eaton company is clearing down a whole block to rebuild.

The best crops for years are expected in Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba, but many of the farmers have become discouraged by the poor crop of recent years and have left their farms. Finest crops, he said, are near Edmonton, where they are the best in five years.
