

Forest Grove Dedicates New City Hall

Forest Grove officially dedicated its new city hall and fire station at a two-day celebration Friday and Saturday, with huge crowds attending the festivities.

Visitors were numerous in the city, with everyone inspecting the new \$20,000 city structure, bedecked with huge baskets of flowers as gifts of organizations and neighboring cities. The city's fire-fighting equipment was on display in the new fire station equipment room. Hugh McGilvra was master of ceremonies at Friday night's opening program, given from a huge platform facing the city hall on the appropriately named Council Street.

On Saturday evening the celebration included inspection of the new Gale Grange quarters, located over the post office. The building was bought by the grangers five years ago and has recently been remodeled. Legion Memorial hall was the scene of a gala dance that overflowed into the roped-off city block as the crowds grew larger.

One-Third of Claims Paid

SALEM, August 17.—One-third of the \$5,899 determined eligible claims against the state unemployment compensation fund have been paid to zero balance and cumulative disbursements totaled \$433,614 at the close of business for July, commission officials reported here today.

Those who have exhausted their current jobless insurance rights received an average of \$100 each and the gradual reduction of the claim load caused another 13 per cent drop in benefit payments for July as compared with June. July totals were 35 per cent less than those for May. Officials credited repayment for part of the reduction.

The Portland metropolitan area, which includes Washington, Columbia and parts of Clackamas county, accounted for 46 per cent of the July state total of \$475,870. This amount was distributed over 43,341 checks, bringing the cumulative check total since benefit payments started in January to 381,003.

MAY PRIVATE CITIZENS REPORT TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS?

It is a private citizen's privilege and duty to report traffic violations to officials, particularly those violations which result or might result in accidents. The citizen so reporting should be willing to appear as a complaining witness against the offender should the case be brought to trial.

The citizen should be sure he has recorded the license number of the offender accurately, and has noted the time, place and exact nature of the offense. Cases of flagrant speeding, disregard of pedestrians' right-of-way, and running stop lights are examples of violations which often have serious consequences.

Many local safety councils in Oregon are preparing to organize regular citizens' observation corps which will be trained in violation-reporting work.

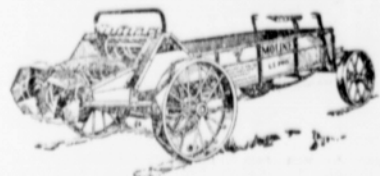

Eleven foreign-born county residents were in Hillsboro Wednesday taking preliminary examinations and filing second citizenship papers with R. L. Blackman of the immigration service.

Final examinations and naturalization hearings will be held here some time in November. It was announced, and those taking tests yesterday were preparing for that event. Those included were Louis and Rosalia Czerget of Orenco from Hungary; John Warkko, Hillsboro route 4, and August Herman Salzwedel, Cornelius route 1, from Germany; Conrad Emanuel Pieren, Hillsboro route 1, from Switzerland; Maria Crowther, Forest Grove, and James Nickle, Hillsboro, both from Canada; Peter Swanson and Ida Paulina Swanson, Cherry Grove, from Sweden; Romanee Miller, Hillsboro route 5, from Belgium; and Alfred Drake, Beaverton route 2, from England.

CIO Unionists Seek Back Pay from Mill

Seeking back pay from the Carnation Lumber company of Forest Grove, about 30 workers of the C. I. O. union presented their case this week at a National Labor Relations board hearing at the federal court house in Portland.

Workers of the C. I. O. union have not worked at the Carnation mill since mid-October, 1937, when they called a strike. At that time the mill continued operations with an A. F. of L. crew. The case being built by the C. I. O. union charges the company with unfair labor practices and collusion with the A. F. of L. Ed McSorlie, business agent of Local No. 5 of the C. I. O. John Linstrom, R. E. Miller and Cletus Hanson, all Forest Grove men, appeared as witnesses at Wednesday's morning hearing. Three of the men testified that attempts had been made to have them sign A. F. of L. cards, contingent to working in the mill.

William G. Hare, Hillsboro attorney, is representing the A. F. of L. in the hearings, which will probably be concluded this week, according to Patrick H. Walker, board attorney from Spokane.

Mrs. Benson Dies After Long Illness

Mrs. Amanda Benson, 71, died here shortly before noon Wednesday, after an illness of three years' duration.

She was the wife of Henry Benson of Hillsboro route 3, who survives, as do a son, Eric G. Benson of Portland, and a sister, Mrs. Sigrid Olson of Lebanon. Mrs. Benson was a native of Sweden, born on July 7, 1867. She had been in the United States for the past 25 years.

WHAT IS A CERTIFICATE OF TITLE FOR AN AUTOMOBILE?

A certificate of title is simply a document issued by the secretary of state evidencing the fact that the holder of the certificate is the owner of the automobile in question. The certificates are numbered consecutively and bear a complete description of the vehicles to which they apply, together with the names and addresses of the owners and a statement of any liens recorded on the title records.

Issuance of certificates of title by state motor vehicle departments dates back only a few years, but this practice has largely cleared up the chaos that formerly existed regarding the ownership of automobiles. Since possession of a valid certificate is prima facie evidence of ownership, lawsuits concerned with this question are much less numerous than formerly.

First Rains Fall During Past Week

First rain in six weeks fell during the past few days, with a total of 1.1 of an inch recorded up to noon Wednesday, according to A. W. Moore, biological survey representative.

First cloudy days in many weeks brought 65 precipitation Saturday, with 12 Sunday. Following two clear days, another .64 inches of rain fell by noon Wednesday, marking one of the few occasions during the dry summer that any precipitation has been noted. Last heavy rains were in mid-April. It was reported with a showery week the first of May. Slightly more than one-third of an inch of rainfall was recorded on June 16 and 17, and on July 1, the precipitation was .22 inches. The total for the past three and a half months, however, is only .74 inches.
