Delay Danger in PWA Applications

Inertia on the part of northwest communities may cause them to lose out in participation in the new PWA program, according to C. C. Hockley, regional director. September 30 is deadline for applications on grants and loans, necessitating prompt presentation of construction needs.

More than 250 applications for construction projects in the region, which includes Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Alaska, have been received, but approximately 750 more application forms sent out have not yet been heard from. Delay in filing applications may bring disappointment to communities wishing to share in program benefits. Response from the entire nation has been so great that many worthy and eligible projects may not obtain allotments because they have been received too late. Hockley quoted Administrator Harold L. Ickes as saying: Up to August 13, a total of \$13,569,529 in loans and grants had been approved for the district, of which 35 allotments, totaling \$1,626,942 were for Oregon.

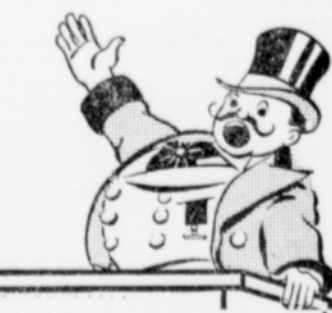

A new system of tax-bookkeeping, developed by the department of audits of the Oregon department of state, has been installed in Polk, Deschutes and Klamath counties, and Coos county is making an independent installation, according to Secretary of State Earl Snell. The chief feature of the new system is that tax records for a given piece of property are kept for a 10-year period on a single loose-leaf sheet, instead of being recorded as single-line entries in large ledgers along with other unrelated entries. The

loose-leaf sheets are filed according to location, adjoining plots and blocks being in consecutive order.
