

McPheeters Plan Itinerary for Six Weeks' Trip

Leaving Hillsboro Friday, September 2, Postmaster and Mrs. L. T. McPheeters will head east on a six weeks' trip which will take them through the middle west New York, the South, Oklahoma, the Grand Canyon, California and way points before they return home in mid-October.
