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New Tax Scheme Argument Filed

"A two per cent transaction tax in Oregon would penalize producers, vacate buildings, increase prices, drive customers to buy outside of Oregon," it is stated in an argument against the proposed new two per cent levy that will be voted on in Oregon next November, which argument was filed for the official voters' pamphlet by fifty men and women and Oregon Business & Investors, Inc., the state taxpayer organization.

According to the statement, this proposed two per cent tax is in addition to all other taxes, including the gasoline tax, and producers of agricultural products, the price of which is fixed elsewhere than in Oregon, will generally have to pay the two per cent tax out of their gross receipts.

"Can the farmer get any more for his wheat because, as the seller, he must pay the two per cent tax on what he receives for his grain? Can the livestock man get any more for his steers or lambs? Can the dairyman, with the price of milk set by the state agency, get any more for his milk or cream," the argument asks.

There are only three types of transactions exempt from this proposed two per cent tax, the argument points out. They are interstate transactions, wages paid to employees, and interest on government bonds and transactions through a "governmental agency." Just what is meant by a "governmental agency," is not plain, the argument states.

Cost of borrowing money will be increased because there is a two per cent tax on all interest. Life insurance premiums, rent, gasoline, doctors' fees, and a tax on every marketing or processing stage in the manufacture of wheat into bread is taxed, it is pointed out.

This two per cent transaction tax, which is really "a sales tax on a sales tax, a pyramiding sales tax," is not designed to reduce property taxes, but to raise money for pensions for everyone over 65 years of age, whether the pension is needed or not. To pay the maximum of \$100 a month to more than 67,000 persons would cost the people of Oregon more than \$80,000,000 a year, or more money than all taxes levied by all cities, counties and the state combined, the argument states.
