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Dr. Rossman Tells Rotarians

Youth Problem Acute; State

4-H Leader Scheduled Today

Dr. J. H. Rossman of Portland, first president of the Hillsboro Rotary club and at present member of the Portland school board, described the nation's youth problem as acute at the Rotary luncheon Thursday in the chamber of commerce rooms. Sam Coy was program chairman.

Dr. Rossman praised the efforts of the local Rotary club in boys' work and said the community should be proud of the high standing of the Hillsboro Boy Scout district in the Portland area council. He declared that it was not the fault of such organizations as Rotary that the youth problem was as acute as it is today.

"If we have been unsuccessful in citizenship training lets put the blame on the adult and not on youth," asserted Dr. Rossman. "Let us not blame youth so much when the average age of the criminal has dropped from 28 to 19 in ten years."

The play parlayed by heredity, environment and the nation's economic condition in the youth problem was pointed out by Dr. Rossman, who held that if the people of the country were educated as to the effects of heredity the taxpayers' bill for state institutions would be less.

He averred that boys' work was really a greater national program than a local one. Inability of a boy to get a job at a time when he needs it was cited as one of the greatest difficulties. Dr. Rossman expressed the belief that American spirit and ingenuity would solve it, however.

Fred Seymour, state 4-H club leader, will be the speaker at the luncheon this noon (Thursday). He has been 4-H leader in Oregon for 23 years and during this time he has built Oregon's 4-H club program up to the state is recognized as one of the leaders in the nation. Last year the enrollment was 25,000 boys and girls carrying projects valued at \$300,000. H. A. Deck is chairman today.

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Grand Jury Indictments Returned

Smith Jury Disagrees
On Circuit Case Here;
New Trial Planned

Louis Vandehey was indicted on an involuntary manslaughter charge by the county grand jury, which concluded a four-day session Monday afternoon. Three secret indictments were returned and Mike Naumcheff was arrested when a warrant, charging him with assault, was issued upon receipt of his indictment. Vandehey is alleged to be the driver who struck and fatally injured Edward Greeley, Forest Grove resident, September 11.

Jury Deadlocked
After six hours of deliberation a circuit court jury hearing the felony case of the state against LeRoy Smith, 62, of Los Angeles, was deadlocked and the jurors were discharged at 11:15 a. m. Wednesday.

District Attorney G. Russell Morgan indicated yesterday that there will be a second trial of this case.

The 12 jurors were locked up around 11:30 p. m. Tuesday and convened again at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday.

LeRoy Smith, resting in a double-deck cot sat in front of the jury box, wearily waiting for the jury verdict on the charge made by his brother, Dr. C. T. Smith, Hillsboro, that he had threatened his life.

The defendant is suffering from injuries received recently in Portland when he was tapped on the head by a blind man during his attempt to settle a Park Block argument.

Democrats to Hold Session
Metzger Tonight; G. O. P.
Rally at Aloha Monday

The political pot is simmering in Washington county and the order of the day for republican and democratic forces. Several rallies have been scheduled by both camps and the respective central committees are contending to work out programs of action.

Big Rally Planned
A county-wide rally at Hillsboro union high school Saturday night, October 22, will climax a series of democratic meetings which have been held in all parts of the county in the last two months.

Albert Kemmer of Beaverton, who heads a committee of 17 as general chairman for the big event, has announced that Henry Hess, democratic candidate for governor; Willis Mahoney, U. S. senatorial candidate; Andy Burk, candidate for congress, and Emily Edson, secretary of state candidate, will be headliners. Efforts will be made to secure an speaker on, at least one bill to appear on the November ballot.

"The program, as planned, should appeal to all thinking citizens of the county," Kemmer said.

Republicans to Rally
Republican central committee meetings have been scheduled for the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce rooms for tonight (Thursday) at 8 o'clock and October 27.

A republican rally will be held at Aloha October 7, according to Chairman Leon S. Davis. A good program is being arranged he said.
