

Yearling Teams Meet Saturday In Portland

The question as to just how good is the freshman football crop at University of Oregon and Oregon State will be at least partially answered Saturday night when the Frosh and Rooks hold the first game of their annual "Little Civil War" series in the Multnomah stadium.

Two former Hills footballers, Bob Sutherland and Jack Himmelright, are listed on the Rook second team and stand a good chance of seeing action against the Ducklings.

Average Favors Beavers

The good old law of averages is in favor of the Beaver Babes for they have won but a single game out of the six played with the Ducklings during the past two years. But with these former prep stars playing under new coaches and a different system, anything can happen from a man totting the pigskin to the wrong goal line or a player tackling his own teammate.

John Warren, former Astoria high coach, is the Frosh mentor, while "Wild Bill" McKelip is the Rook head man. Joe Gray, Elmer Kolberg and Hillsboro's Dick Sutherland, brother of Bob Sutherland, are assisting McKelip with his coaching duties.

Word from both schools indicates that they more than held their own in getting future varsity material with the Webfeet boasting a 200-pound average on the starting Frosh line and the Beavers shouting that they've got the best Rook team that's been at Corvallis during the past ten years.

Spartan B's Win Opener

Touchdowns by Jack VanLom and Ike Tsugawa gave Spartan "B" eleven a 12 to 0 win over Tigard Bees in their first game of the season Thursday on the Hills football field. Both scores were made through the line following long runs by the Spartan backs. Outstanding for the local eleven were Dave Cooper, pivot man, and Jim Abbs, tackle, on the line and Leroy Campbell and VanLom and Tsugawa in the backfield.

The Hills "B" eleven won their second game of the week when they routed the Silverdale "B" team 22 to 0 here Tuesday afternoon. Three of the Spartan scores were via the aerial route with little Ike Tsugawa doing the tossing. The other two were through the center of the line.

Jack Van Lom and Fay Harstel accounted for two touchdowns each while Wallace Ramp got credit for the remaining score. Two conversions were made by Van Lom. Besides having the touchdowns, Tsugawa made a number of long runs. Chuck Teves and Dave Cooper turned in good performances for the line.

Compensation for Job Lack Drops

SALEM—Distribution of unemployment compensation in Oregon dropped 29 per cent during September, the commission's monthly report disclosed.

Continued favorable weather and employment conditions and final payments of benefits to 1939 more claimants accounted for the expected decrease in issuance of checks, official said. Claims satisfied in full service in the current benefit year now total 26,667.

The metropolitan area of Multnomah, Columbia, Washington and part of Clackamas counties received \$151,927 of the state total of \$267,211. This was 51.9 per cent, or an increase of 2 per cent over August total.

September checks brought the cumulative total for the state to \$3,021,344, distributed over 447,663 checks.

Marshfield moved into second place for the month, with 7 per cent of total benefit amounts, and Oregon City showed a big gain to \$207,211. This was 51.9 per cent. Salem was fourth, with 4.8 per cent, while The Dalles continued to be less concerned with jobless insurance, receiving only \$1670, or 6 per cent.

Decreased portions of the state total were noted for McMinnville, Newport, Salem, Eugene, Klamath Falls and Baker.

Specialty Crop Production Information Given by Recently Published Statistical Bulletin

A detailed listing by counties of estimates of acreage, production, price and income from certain specialty farm products in Oregon is now available for the first time with the publication of a statistical bulletin by the Oregon Extension Service on these data for 1936. A companion bulletin, giving even more complete statistics for 1937, will follow within a month or two.

The bulletin was made possible by a study authorized by the last legislature, under which the information was obtained through personal contact with more than 700 informed persons, including growers, shippers, dealers, manufacturers, federal agricultural statisticians, county agents and other agricultural leaders in each of the 36 counties. Authors of the bulletin are M. B. Thomas and L. R. Brothaupt, extension economist and C. J. Bottom, federal agricultural statistician, whose office in Portland gave close co-operation in the study.

Specialty Crops Listed
A long list of Oregon's important specialty crops are not included in the regular crop estimates of the bulletin. The bulletin contains 46 tables of estimates of acreage, production, price and income.
