First meeting of the Washington County Council of Parent-Teachers was held October 11 in the Knights of Pythias hall at North Plains. As the first meeting is a school of instruction at which state officers are present to answer any technical questions all local associations are urged to send representatives to receive the very latest in help to carry on this Parent-Teacher movement. Mrs. F. W. Blum, first vice-president, state congress of Parent-Teachers, conducted the school of instruction and had an exceptionally large and interested attendance from local associations.

Due to Mrs. Blum's having to leave the meeting for a short time the business of the Washington county council was conducted after the first half of the school of instruction. Eleven associations answered roll-call. Mrs. Blum discussed the functions of each standing committee and explained in detail what was expected of each.

It was announced that Governor Martin has proclaimed October 24 to 31 as Parent-Teacher "Enrollment Week." At this time a concerted drive is put on to enroll all interested in Parent-Teacher work in membership.

It was decided by a unanimous vote that the topic for the year to be followed by the county council would be "Know Your Needs of Our Schools." Speakers along educational lines will attend future meetings.
