New Library Books Have Appeal For Varied Tastes

Reviews of new books at the library have been appearing in the Argus this summer, and for those who have missed them the following list will be helpful.

A book of timely interest in the library is "My Battle," by Adolf Hitler. It is not propagandist, but according to Mrs. Georgia Smith, librarian, answers some of the questions which arise as to "Why Hitler Has Persecuted the Jews?" "Why He Wants Austria?" "Will He Make War on Russia?" "What He Thinks of France?" In fact, the book is the leading document of the time and helpful to all who try to understand the amazing political processes of Central Europe, said Mrs. Smith.

"Victoria at 4:30." by Cecil Roberts is an incident in the lives of each of the passengers on the express leaving Victoria at 4:30, and these experiences are later put together, making an excellent book of the lighter vein. A book to study is "Personal and Social Adjustment," by Uhl and Powers, a new up-to-date book on human living. Some of the chapters are: "Your equipment for successful living," "Special guides to successful living," "Personal adjustment to people and situations," "Personality and how to develop your character and citizenship," and many others equally helpful in fitting one for life.

"Doomsday Man," is Priestley's first novel with an American setting, and is a romantic tale of strange adventure in the southwest. Those who read "Midnight on the Desert," and were charmed with the descriptions will delight in the pictures of the west in this story. There is plenty of action in the story, and mystery readers will like it as it is a new kind of mystery yarn with wide appeal.
